Mrs. Millard Edmiston is seriously ill at the home of her father-in-law, Mr. Samuel Edmiston.

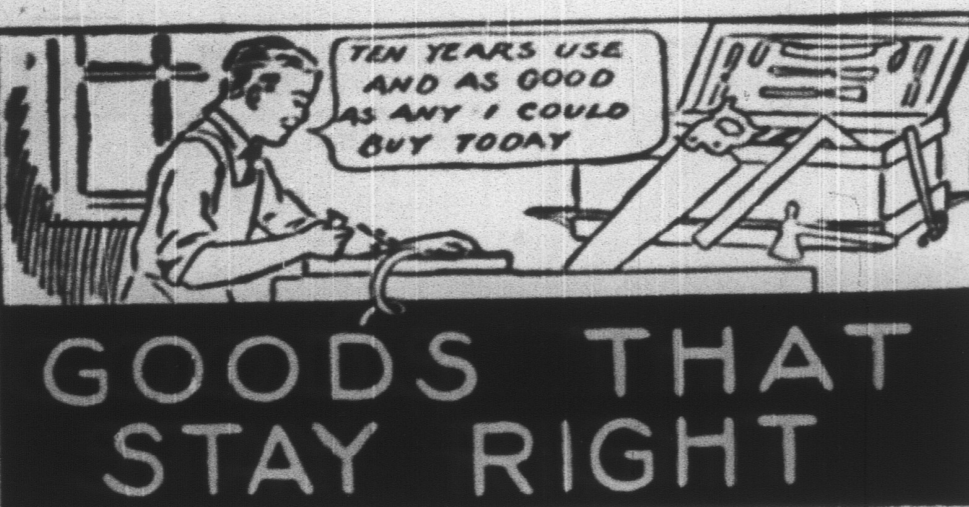
