## A New Pump Station

The Patton Water Company is making arrangements to put in a pumping station to supply the demand for the increasing population of Patton. A crew of men have been testing the supply on the east and west side of Chest Creek and have decided to place the station about a quarter of a mile south of town on the east side, seventy feet from the ever flowing stream, opposite the Beech Creek repair shops.

The machinery has been shipped and is expected to arrive at any time when it will be placed and be put in operation before many weeks. A duplex pump with a capacity of 340 gallons a day will be put in. It will pump direct into Flannigan run reservoir or supply the town by direct pumping into the water main or pipes against a pressure as the case may be. The intention is to put down a large well which will be walled up and carefully cemented.

The question of fire protection for outlying districts will now be a matter for the borough to take up as the Patton Water company will have sufficient capacity to meet every requirement.

## May Stop Over in Patton

Cornelius, of this place, who holds the esteemed office of Quarter Master Sergeant in the Sheridan Troop of Juniata Valley, of the Second Brigade of the National Guards of Pennsylvania, is making an ardent effort to have the troop spend a night in Patton, while en route to camp, which takes place near Kensington, on the Allegheny river, August 4th. At the present time the coal is hauled from the headings by mules, and by the use of the rope haulage system considerably unnecessary labor will be done away with, and the output can be much increased.
