LICE ON YOUNG PIGS

Lice are liable to be particularly serious on young, growing pigs. The practice at the Pennsylvania State State College is to spray the pigs with a light crude oil as often as necessary. This is intended to keep down both lice and eggs in quarters and pens. Several patent hog oilers on the market have proven of some value. Where these are not practicable the best method is hand spraying or dipping. If a commercial dip solution is used two applications are necessary, one ten days after the first.

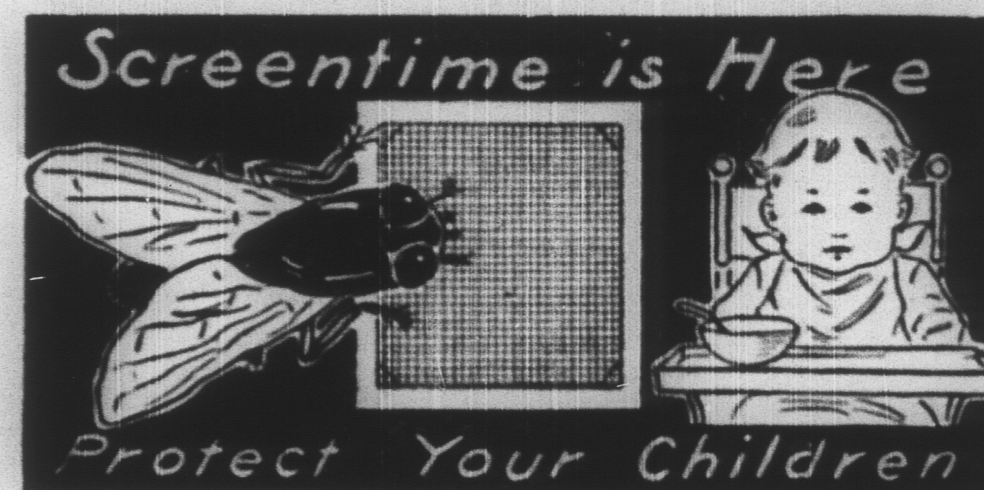
