SECOND BLAST IS FEARED AND RECUE WORK HALTED

PROBES FOLLOW DISASTER

Gas in Lake Erie Tunnel Is Too Thick for Hunt for Bodies -- Mine Rescue Car on the Scene.

Cleveland, O.-Twenty two men are known to be dead and a dozen injured as a result of an explosion of gas in a water works tunnel under construction between a pumping station on land and an intake crib, five miles out in Lake Erie.

All the men whose bodies have been recovered gave up their lives in futile attempt to save their com-

The men were working 50 feet below the bottom of the lake, which is 75 feet deep at that point, r ing them 120 feet below the water's surface. The explosion came as the tunnelworkers broke through a gas vein with their picks and shovels and the funies ignited from electric sparks.

Rescue Work Stopped. Federal officials investigating the disaster ordered all attempts to reach the bodies of 12 men imprisoned in he tunnel abandoned.

This action was taken because tests of the gas in the tunnel through which the rescuers had to pass showed that it is highly explosive and the officials feared another explosion. An attempt will be made to pump out the gas so that the work of recovering the


