CIVIL WAR VETERANS HOLD FINE REUNION IN WILKINSBURG

Survivors of Eleventh Reserves Report Ten Deaths During Past Year

Thirty-two survivors of the Eleventh Pennsylvania Reserves attended their 27th annual reunion Wednesday, July 11th at the Miffin avenue Methodist Episcopal Church, Wilkinsburg, where the veterans of the Civil War reported ten deaths among their number since the reunion held in the summer of 1916. Among them was that of Charles Fagan, of Company A, which went out from Ebensburg under command of Robert Litzinger. He passed away in New York State. Joseph Elder, of Company E, was another member of the Regimental Association to pass away. He expired at Natrona. Comrade Samuel Judy, of Johnstown, was the only survivor of Company A at Wednesday's reunion and Major W. H. H. Bell, of this place was one of the three survivors of Company E in attendance. Regrets were read from Comrade Dallas Patrick, of Company A, who is residing at Mahaffey. Letters were also read from Comrade Thomas O'Neill and Comrade Phillips, who are both ill at Brookville.

The stories of the veterans around the campfire Wednesday harked back to the days of bloody hand-to-hand conflicts when each was a component of the Fifth Army Corps known as "The Malters Cross." They bagoneted the "Johnnies" at Gaines' New Creek, Mechanicsville, Second Bull Run, South Mountain, leaving comrades under the forest leaves at Antietam. They saw the charge of the Irish Brigade at Fredericksburg, when a regiment was almost wiped out. Gettysburg, the Wilderness and the massacre at Cold Harbor were not forgotten. A victim of Libby prison was present. These veterans began in June, 1861, and fought to the Civil War's close in 1865.

The evening session began with the Wilkinsburg Troop of Boy Scouts firing a salute to a flag waving above the church lawn. Company G of the Boys Brigade gave a military drill. Capt. C. I. Barr commanding. A squad of the Hospital Corps gave an exhibition drill. Capt. J. M. Fischer commanding. Col. James E. Porter made the principal address.

The Rev. J. R. Wolf, pastor of the church, where the campfire was held, after visiting and re-visiting the battlefields of the Civil War, collected lantern slides of those scenes of blood. He gave a graphic lecture, revealing spots and recounting incidents never heard before by his comrades.

Major Bell told the veterans that he has two grandsons now in the service of the United States and that if they are as good as their "granddads" was the end of the war is near. The two grandsons are Bruce and John Bell, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Lincoln Bell, of this place. They enlisted recently at State College. Major Bell has four other grandsons who will likely be called into service.

Comrade John T. Kelly, of Butler, was re-elected President to serve until next June, when the veterans will assemble at Indiana, and Comrade John H. Sutton, of Indiana, and Comrade John H.
