30 REGISTERED MEN HAVE FAILED TO APPEAR BEFORE THE LOCAL EXAMINING BOARD

This Number Is Exclusive of Those Who Had Enlisted. 240 More Called For Examination Next Monday and Wednesday

BOARD WILL ACT ON EXEMPTIONS TODAY

Of the 440 registered men for military service in this district who have failed to appear for examination to date, 30 have failed to put in their appearance before the local examining board. This number is exclusive of registered men who had enlisted in the army previous to the draft. The local examining board will tomorrow take action upon the failure of these men to appear. The numbers and names of these men appear below. A number of them, have perhaps failed to appear through illness.

Of the 80 men called for examination Friday of last week 70 appeared and 56 of this number passed the examination.

Of the 100 men called for examination Saturday of last week, 83 appeared and 69 passed the examination.

Of the 100 called for examination Monday of this week 83 appeared and 71 passed the examination.

240 more men have been notified to appear next week, 120 on Monday, August 27, and 120 on Wednesday, August 29. Their serial numbers, order numbers, names and addresses follow:

MRS. BERNETTA DILLON, OF CARROLLTOWN, DEAD

Bernetta, wife of Robert Dillon, died Saturday night at 12:30 o'clock at her home in Carrolltown, of complication of diseases, following the birth of a son. Mrs. Dillon was ill less than a day and her untimely death was a shock to the community as well as to her family. The deceased was aged 40 years. She is survived by her husband and eight children, who are the following: Mary, Leo, Ruth, Paul, John, Louise, Patrick, and Caroline, all at home. Other survivors of Mrs. Dillon are her mother, Mrs. Amanda Wetzel and the following brother and sisters: William, Fannie, Golda, and Sharbaugh, of Carrolltown, and Mrs. John McConnel, of Mammoth. The late Mrs. Daniel Bradley, who died April 23 at Johnstown was also a sister of Mrs. Dillon. Mr. and Mrs. Dillon were married in St. Benedict's Church, Carrolltown, in 1901 the Rev. Father Herman, O. S. E., officiating. After the wedding Mr. and Mrs. Dillon resided for about five years near Hastings.

The funeral of Mrs. Dillon took place Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock in St. Benedict's Church. After a solemn requiem mass, interment was made in St. Benedict's Cemetery.

The funeral services of John Edward, the infant son of Mr. and Mrs. John Hickson, were held on Thursday afternoon, August 16th, at the house, and were conducted by Pastor E. G. Zwyer of the Baptist Church, assisted by Pastor Wayland Zwyer of the Calvary Chapel. After the services the body was taken to Hawk Run where it was buried in the family lot. Profound sympathy is felt for the bereaved family by their many friends in the loss of their little son.

FLINTON CHILD DIES OF INFANTILE PARALYSIS

Another Case of Dread Disease Reported in Lilly Borough

Two cases of infantile paralysis in Cambria County have been reported to Dr. W. E. Matthews, Cambria County Medical Inspector. One is at Lilly. The other was at Flinton. The Flinton victim died on Saturday, having been ill only a day or two.

The Flinton and the Lilly cases were the first to be reported in Cambria County this year. Strict quarantines have been established at both places.

The only case of smallpox in Cambria County, that found in Sang Hollow, has been pronounced cured. The patient, a negro, has been discharged from Municipal Hospital and the camp in which he was employed has been fumigated thoroughly.

DRAFT "SLACKERS" TO BE ARRESTED

Washington, Aug. 19.—Renewed instructions that drafted men who fail to report for service will be classified and published as deserters were sent to United States district attorneys and agents of the department of justice tonight by Attorney General Gregory. Provost Marshal General Crowder has ruled that persons who neglect to appear for examination will be accepted automatically, and that the privilege of claiming exemption will be denied. It was to help carry this policy into effect that the attorney general acted. His instructions follow:

"It has been determined by the provost marshal general that persons who fail to appear for their physical examination after having received their notices to do so from the local boards, by such failure waive their right to physical examination and are accepted by the board without such examinations. Their names will be certified to the district boards as chosen by the local boards for the national army.

Will Be Drafted As Deserters. "If they do not then appear to claim exemptions they will waive their right to such exemption as they might have claimed; and their names will be certified by the district boards to the adjutant general of their respective states as persons for the national army. The adjutant general will then mail them a notice to report for duty at a special time and place, and such notices will be given publicity according to the regulations of the conscription act.

"Such persons then become subject to the military authorities at the time designated by the adjutant general for them to report. Should they fail to comply with this notice they become deserters from the army and will be treated as such by the military authorities.

Should Give Correct Addresses. "It is, therefore, a matter of vital concern not so much to the government as to themselves to see that they give the correct address for their notices to be mailed to them. Should they fail to comply with these notices after receiving them, they become automatically drafted without regard to physical examination, or to exemption or discharge.

"Where persons are known to be willfully refusing to comply with the requests of the local board and are so conducting themselves as to be a menace to the proper enforcement of the conscription act, and their whereabouts are known, they should be detained in jail on complaints charging violation of section 4 of this conscription act until the time when they are ordered by the adjutant general to report for duty in the national army. They should, at that date, be turned over to the military authorities. No prosecution need be had, as it will be unnecessarily expensive and little is to be gained therefrom."

L. A. SHARBAUGH BUYS STORE AT CARROLLTOWN

The Carrolltown store of J. W. Sharbaugh, deceased since June 23, was purchased by his son, L. A. Sharbaugh and will be continued under the name of the Sharbaugh Dry Goods Store.

The late J. W. Sharbaugh was engaged in the mercantile business for nearly a half a century prior to his death. L. A. Sharbaugh grew up from his childhood in a commercial atmosphere and with the exception of a few years, has always been engaged in the store business.

LILLY MAN SUICIDES IN JAIL BY HANGING

Following a row with a girl in Lilly Saturday afternoon which resulted in his arrest, Mike Bodi, aged 45 years, Slavonic, hanged himself with his belt in the Lilly jail that same evening between 7 and 8 o'clock. Bodi, who is said to have a wife and nine children in the old country insisted on marrying the girl and she objected.

Constable George of that place locked the fellow up at 5 o'clock and he was found dead three hours later.

P. R. R. WILL NOT CLAIM EXEMPTION FOR ITS MEN

Pittsburgh, Aug. 29.—No claims for exemption of any of its employees will be made by the Pennsylvania Railroad, according to announcement today by Col. T. J. Keenan, chairman of the Appellate Board handling exemption cases in this district.

The announcement was made at a conference between the Appellate Board and representatives of local boards at the courthouse.

STATE AGRICULTURAL NOTES

The average price of cherries was three cents higher than last year and raspberries and blackberries were two cents higher.

The Pennsylvania wheat crop will be almost a million bushels more than estimated a month ago and may reach 24,000,000 bushels.

An excellent hay crop is predicted for the State, despite the discouraging conditions during the early season. The average acre yield will be about 1.45 tons.
