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WOMAN-POWER OF CAMBRIA WILL REGISTER SEPT. 22ND

Saturday, September 22nd, the Official Registration of the women power of Cambria county, under the direction of the Women's Committee, Council of National Defense, will begin—providing the government has the cards in the hands of the local Committee by that time.

The aim of this registration is to record in definite form the training, capacity, and willingness for service of as many women as can be reached throughout the country. It is not compulsory but every woman should consider it her patriotic duty to put her talent at the service of her country, either for compensation or voluntarily.

In other words, with the registration know how many women in his domain know how many women in his domain have had experience, or desire training, in dairying, farming, fruit raising, bookkeeping, housekeeping, millinery, music pharmacy, telegraphy, etc., in 154 specified occupations along these lines.

If the woman desire to work in their home town they can so specify, if they are willing to go anywhere in the United States, a position in Washington may be open to a woman in Pennsylvania who is competent to fill it. More than 500 girls in one city were thus benefited after a similar State registration. There is a rapidly increasing demand for women in positions hitherto filled by men. Effort will be made to provide training for girls who have not previously had it. The registration card is the medium through which connection may be made between the worker and the task.

Ministers and Priests will be asked to announce this registration from the pulpit or on the church bulletin board next Sunday. At dances, fairs, clubs, in fact, at any gathering an appeal to the women to co-operate with the Government will be made.

The Department of Registration of the Pennsylvania Division will be charged with the execution of the whole plan and Mrs. Walter King Sharpe, General Director, has delegated the work to our County Committee, who in turn are sub-dividing the work among committees on registration or individual registrars in the cities, towns, villages and rural districts.

The headquarters of the local county registration committee during the time of registration will be at the rooms of the Young Woman's Christian Association, 420 Main Street, Johnstown, Pa. But after the work is completed the cards will probably be filed in the office of the Executive Secretary of the local County Committee of Public Safety.
