MAY SECURE DISCHARGE BY FILING SERVICE CLAIM

Soldiers Will be Released on Proper Declaration That He is Needed—Release for Illness is Given.

Revised instructions for former employers who desire to secure the early discharge of men from the American forces abroad has been received by the local office of the United States employment service. It provides for the making of affidavits by employers, which are to be forwarded by the nearest branch of the employment service to the soldier himself, for presentation to his immediate commanding officer. The applicant for discharge then goes on the list for mobilization.

If the man whose discharge is desired has a position awaiting him with the firm which employed him before August 4, 1914, the employer must fill out a declaration or affidavit reading as follows:

"I (or we) (full name and postal address of employer), hereby declare that full name, rank and number and military or naval address of employee) was in my (or our) employment before August 4, 1914, and that I am (or we are) prepared to offer him employment as (state occupation) immediately after his return to civil life (or give the date after which the employment will be available).

In Case of Sickness.

In case a soldier has work awaiting him and is not with the firm which employed him before August 4, 1914, the above affidavit form may be employed, with reference to the date, August 4, 1914, stricken out.

The employment service emphasizes the fact that early discharge of men can be secured in this manner only where they are urgently needed in their former employment.

Where sickness or other disease exists in the soldier's family, relatives should make affidavit to that effect, giving the circumstances of the case, soldier's full name and address and commanding officer, and it will be forwarded to the commanding officer for action.

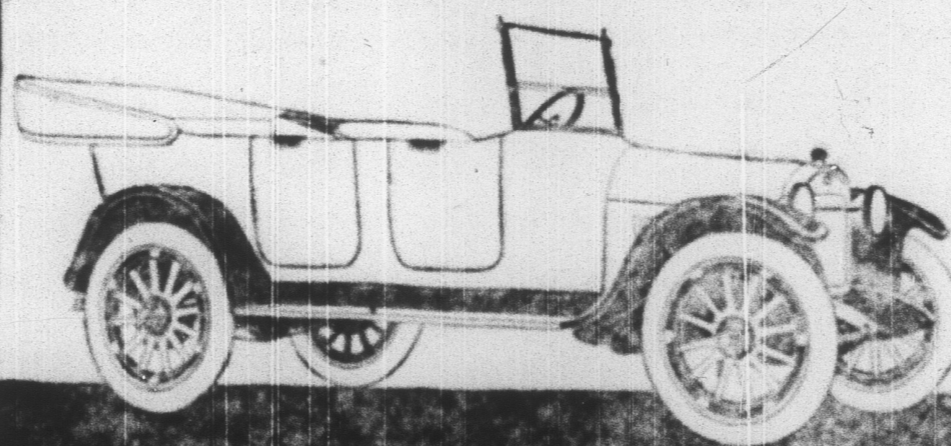

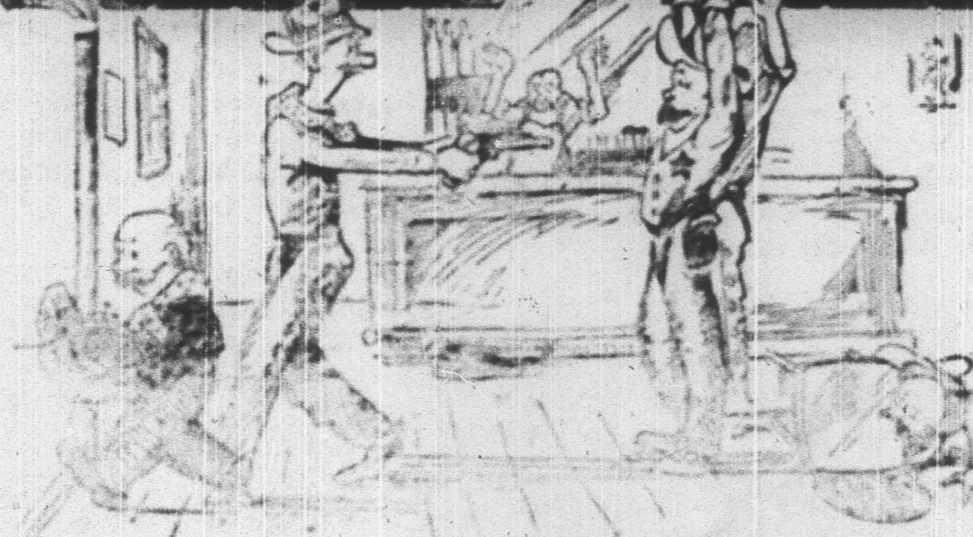

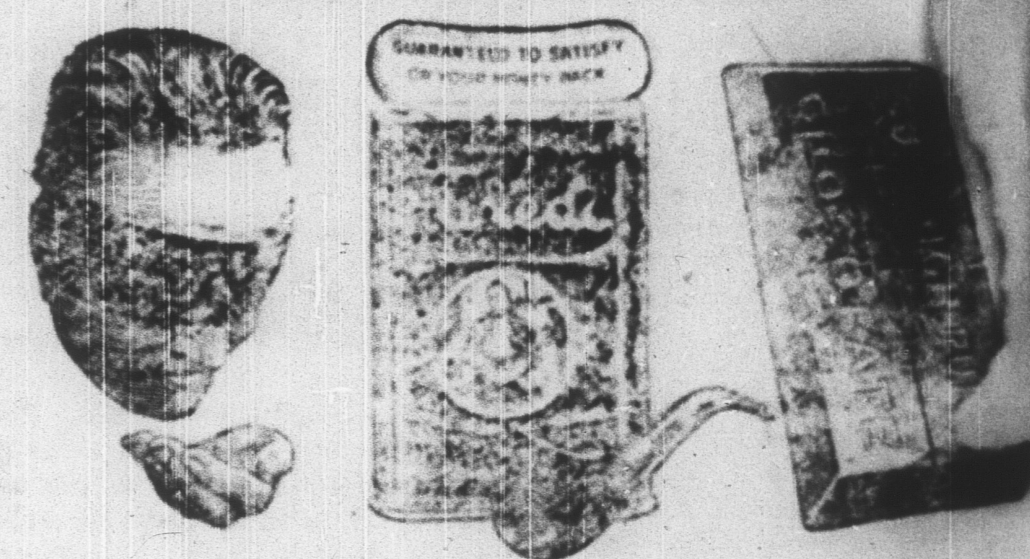
