Washington that the 8,000 American troops in Siberia will be brought home as soon as the Czech-Slovak forces now there are repatriated.
The Graham Sedition bill, carrying the death penalty, was favorably reported by the House Judiciary Committee. Representative Graham advocated it in a speech.
Bituminous coal operators seek more light on the scope of the Coal Commission's work before promising to abide by the commission's findings, while the miners flatly pledge themselves to accept whatever finding may be reached.
The French steamship Afrique sank in the Bay of Biscay. She carried 465 passengers and a crew of 100. The only known survivors are twenty-six persons picked up in two lifeboats.
It is believed in Paris that the Premiers of France, Great Britain and Italy now in conference have agreed that the Turks shall stay in Constantinople.
Comment in British newspapers on the formal signing of the treaty lacked all note of rejoicing, many of the leading journals regretting the absence of the United States and Russia, and voicing rather gloomy forebodings over the outlook for continued peace.
