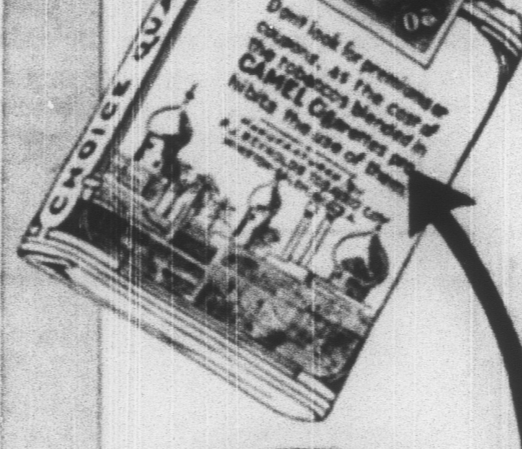

A Union Veteran Union, Post No. 49, was organized on Saturday night in Patton, which is the first lodge to break the ranks in the way of a secret organization here. The muster was held at the opera house and the following officers were elected: Robert Tuttle, Colonel; Ellis C. Howe, lieutenant colonel; Allen McCabe, major; Geo. W. Cassidy, quartermaster; Samuel Barr, sergeant; George Degarmo, chaplain; Edward H. Beebe, officer of the day; Charles Prescott, officer of the guard; John Saltgiver, color bearer; Nordman Richards, sentinel. Meetings will be held every Monday evening in Good's hall.

The Patton Fire Co. elected the following officers: C. C. Crowell, president; F. H. Kinkead, vice-president; L. S. Bell, recording secretary; H. E. Keller, financial secretary; Ed. A. Mellon, treasurer; C. W. Martin, chief; H. C. Beck, W. J. Donnelly, John Scheid, J. F. Bonner and John Boyce, trustees.

#### NAVAL FORCE OF 143,157.

Washington, D. C.—An enlisted naval force of 143,157 for the 1921 year was recommended by Rear Admiral Washington, Chief of Navigation, who told the House Naval Committee that 60,000 recruits or re-enlistments would be necessary to reach that strength.

Shortage exists in all enlisted grades, he said, and an additional 19,294 might be lost by July through expiration of enlistment.

Increased pay is the "only thing," Admiral Washington said, to hold the men in the navy. He added that since the armistice 469 officers of the regular navy had tendered their resignations, practically all for "financial" reasons.

As a part of the navy next year Admiral Washington proposed to use 96,954 reserves, enlisted for four years, and to serve from 12 to 18 months on active duty.
