Snow is beautiful, the poet pro-claims. It is a nuisance, too, at least to some of the pedestrians who must travel on some of the streets in Pat-ton. It may take a little time to shovel the snow from the side walks, but it is not such a big job if one keeps after it following each snow fall. So if your walk is one of those that is next to "impossible," we respectfully eall your attention to Ordinance No. 4, of the Borough of Patton, which reads as follows:

"Section 1. Be it enacted and or-dained by the Burgess and town coun-cil of the Borough of Patton and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same: That hereafter, it shall be the duty of the occupants of lots, and owners of unoccupied lots, along whose premises sidewalks are now, or may hereafter be laid under the Ordinance now in force, or which may hereafter be passed, to cause the sidewalk along their premises to be clean-ed of snow, when, and as often as same shall fall thereon, within six hours after the same shall cease falling, and on default of such occupants or owners having such sidewalks cleaned as aforesaid, he, she, or they, shall be fined in the sum of One Dollar and the cost of cleaning of pavement, to be collected as debts of like amount are now by law recoverable, and it is hereby made the duty of the Burgess to see that suits are brought against all who may offend this ordinance."
