# RESOLUTIONS ARE ADOPTED

Request Representatives to the Legislature from District to Have Laws Enacted.

## CONVENTION CLOSES

CROSSON.—At the closing session of the Cambria County Supervisors and Good Roads Association convention in Odd Fellows' Hall, which was brought to a conclusion Sunday morning, resolutions were passed wherein the Supervisors ask the Representatives from the county to the State Legislature to use all efforts to have enacted laws severing relations now existing, giving the Highway Department control of the township roads. The Supervisors favor the empowering of each Township Board of Supervisors to act for themselves the same as bodies of other incorporated municipalities.

The resolutions follow:

We, the Supervisors of Cambria County, in regular session assembled this 14th day of January, A. D. 1921, having considered the fact that whereas under existing laws of the State Highway Department and the Bureau of Township Highways by the power vested in them, requiring all plans, specifications and executed contracts for permanent township road construction, to be approved by said State Highway Department, together with the further request made recently requiring all monthly estimates for payments to contractors on the several township roads now under construction or to be hereafter constructed in Cambria County to be submitted to and first approved by the Township Commissioner of the State Highway Department, often causes unnecessary delay and inconvenience to the Township Supervisors as well as in some instances may materially increase the cost of said permanent construction, therefore be it

Resolved, That our Representatives be requested to make all efforts to have enacted laws severing the relations now existing, giving the State Highway Department or Bureau of Township Highways, control of the construction and maintenance of township roads and empowering each Township Board of Supervisors to act for themselves the same as bodies of other incorporated municipalities, and be it further

Resolved, That the chair appoint a committee of three to wait on our members of the Legislature with a view of securing, if possible, their pledge to use their influence to have a bill enacted, as above suggested and be it further

Resolved, That the secretary of this association have copies of this resolution prepared and signed and mailed to the proper authorities so that same might properly come before the Legislature.

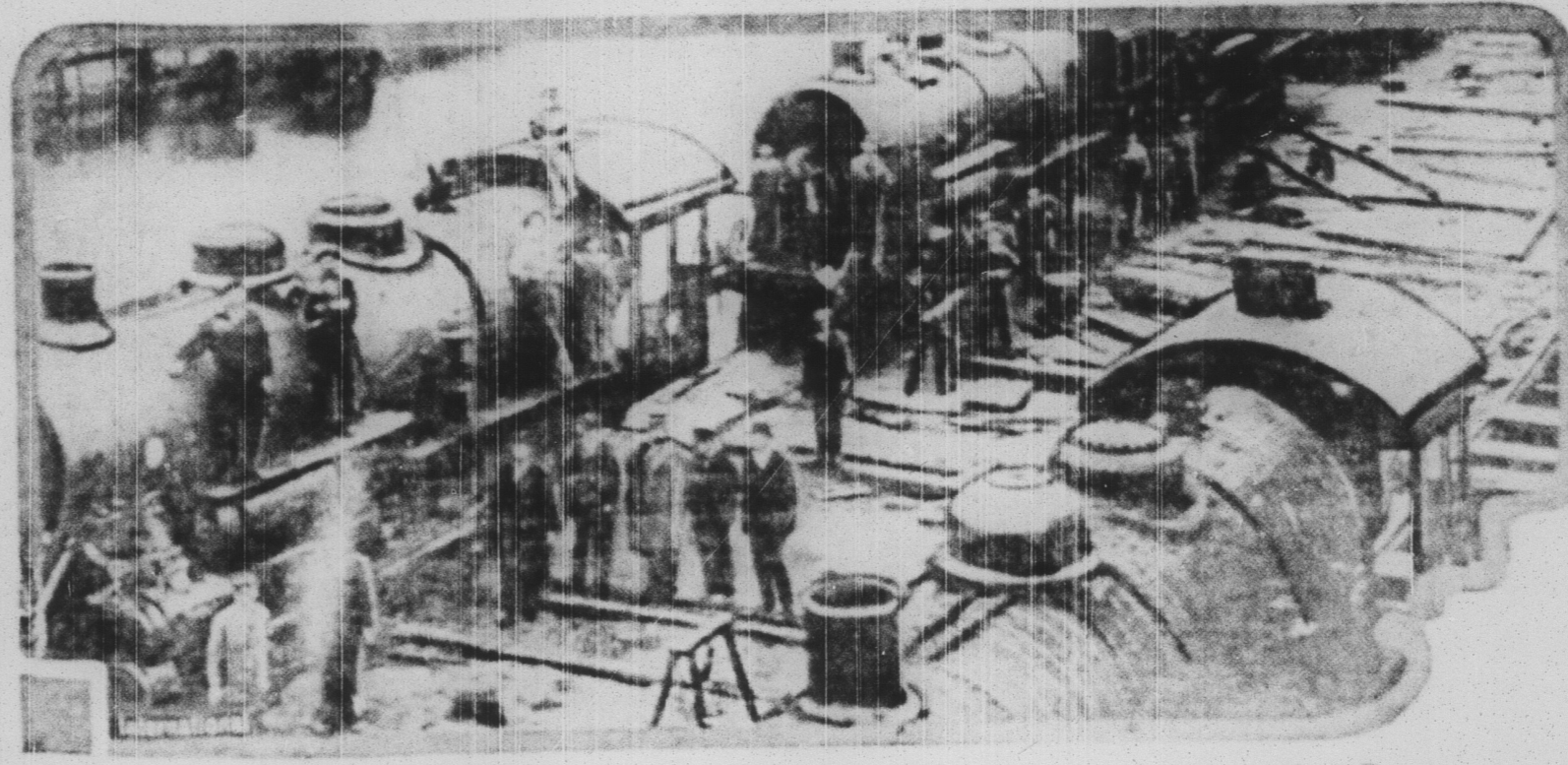

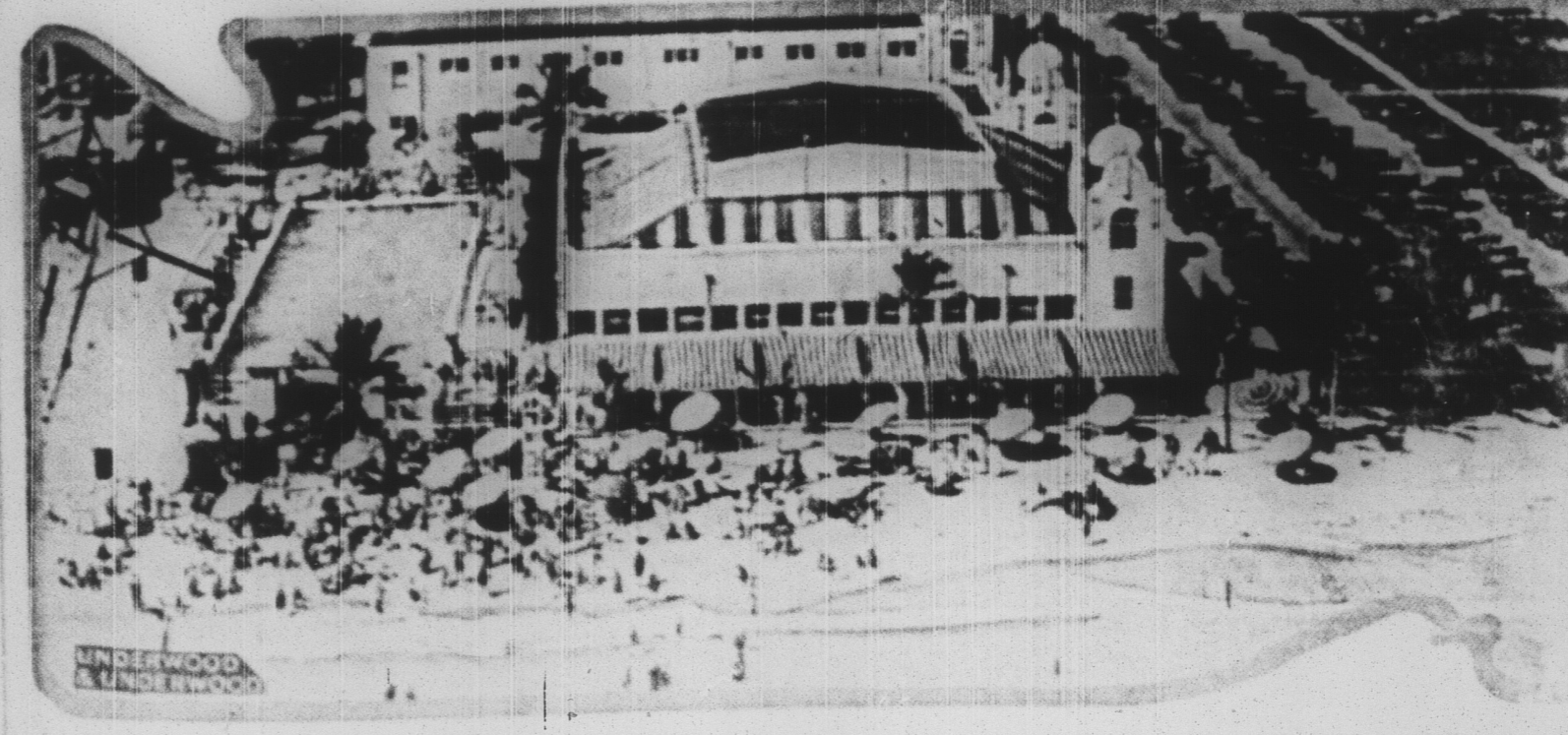

## ATTORNEY M'GUIRE IS NAMED RECEIVER

In Case of John Hanchak vs. G. H. Goughnour; Three Subpenas in Divorce.

Ebensburg.—In the case of John Hanchak vs. G. H. Goughnour, receivership, the court Thursday appointed Attorney W. A. McGuire, of Johnstown, to be permanent receiver.

A verdict was awarded in favor of the plaintiff in the case of the Richards Plumbing and Heating Company against Mrs. L. H. Miller. The plaintiff was awarded the sum of \$125 with interest from May 8, 1919, also the sum of \$2500, with interest from May 14, 1919.

In the case of Francis P. McVay vs. George Tinkhoff, the plaintiff failed to appear and the court directed a nonsuit.

## MRS. JANE GREEN DIES AT COUNTY HOME

Deceased Was Aged 93 Years; Body Taken to Chest Springs for Burial.

Mrs. Jane Green, aged 93 years, who was admitted to the County Home from Chest Springs on August 20, 1919, died at the institution at 6 o'clock a. m. Tuesday. Her death was due to thrombosis of the arteries. Her estate, valued at \$1000, is in charge of the County Home.
