Peter H. Weymer, a veteran of the world war, died Tuesday morning at 11:30 o'clock of tuberculosis at the White Haven sanitarium. He was admitted to the institution two weeks ago, from his home in East Carroll township. The remains were shipped to Carrollton and arrived here this morning. The funeral will be at the Stevens Undertaking Parlor at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning, with a high mass of requiem in St. Benedict's church. Interment will be made in St. Benedict's cemetery. The Fox Peak Post of the American Legion, of which the deceased was a member, will have charge of the funeral.

#### "CHU CHIN CHOW"

F. Ray Comstock and Morris Gest will present the Century Theatre cast and production in their greatest spectacle, "Chu Chin Chow" for a week starting at the Mishler Theatre, commencing Monday night, Mar. 21st, with matinees on Wednesday and Saturday.

"Chu Chin Chow" is the first big spectacle success ever imported from England that brought with it, a complete scenic and costume edition direct from the original producer.

The scenes of ancient Bagdad, all the elaborate creation of Oscar Asche, the author were duplicated at the place of their origin on a scale one third larger than the English production and brought to America for a first showing three years ago. There are 14 scenes of Bagdad, its palaces, dim corridors, gardens, bazaars and mean streets. Three hundred people are employed to present the spectacle, including a dozen ballets of haunting memory, and in its unfolding offering for the delectation of the theatre goers 967 costumes.

The local engagement will be the only play date in this section of Pennsylvania. Almost directly after "Chu Chin Chow" will start an Eastern run at the Shubert Theatre, Philadelphia where it has already played to capacity.

There are 20 scenes to be presented.

Night performances are scheduled to start at 8 P. M. and matinees are announced for 2 P. M.

#### DEATH OF FORMER NORTH CAMBRIAN.

Mrs. Elizabeth Petka, aged 57, a former resident of St. Boniface, passed away at her home here Saturday morning, from heart disease of which she had been a sufferer for some time.
