### FIRE LOSSES IN CAMBRIA COUNTY

Harrisburg, Pa.—The Bureau of Fire Protection has just completed a five years analysis of fire losses in Cambria County. When seventy per cent of all fires are shown to be due to neglect or carelessness, the price paid is beyond all reason. With the cooperation of the various Fire Chiefs, the Bureau of Fire Protection, by increased number of inspections and removal of hazards, hopes to reduce the losses in 1921 an appreciable extent. With the idea of protection in view all citizens should immediately cooperate with the fire chief by removing rubbish and debris from premises, remove any hazardous condition and keep properties in as near a fire proof condition as possible.

#### NANT-Y-GLO WANTS AID IN PAVING OF STREET

EBENSBURG—A delegation from Nant-y-Glo, headed by Burgess Jas. B. Lamont and T. P. Burns, called on the county commissioners concerning financial aid in paving Main street in that borough. The commissioners expressed themselves as favorable to the request and advised the delegation to file an application, together with a survey giving data on the improvements contemplated.

## STATE NEWS

The Lancaster General Hospital faces a deficit of \$15,409 for the year starting Jan. 1. The New York Central locomotive works at Avis have closed again, throwing 50 men out of employment. John Schubert, of Brownsville, was shot in his right leg by an other trooper who was using a revolver. Run down by a six-ton truck, Francis Yeager, aged four, of Altoona, was so terribly injured that he died today.

Large steel mills at Clairton will resume this week, 3000 being called for work in the blast and open hearth departments.

The new Catholic orphanage of the Diocese of Philadelphia, which is in process of preparation at Orangeburg, will be ready to receive orphans in a few weeks, it was announced today. About 50 orphans will be housed. The home is located on one of the most fertile farms in this county and is ideally situated.

Mistaken for a burglar, Harold, 18-year-old son of Councilman George Moore, of Berwick, was shot Sunday night and is dying in the Berwick hospital with a revolver bullet in a lung. He was accompanying Miss Margaret Smothers to her home, and as he stopped around the corner of the house Guy Smothers, the girl's brother and a world war veteran, fired at him.

Eight miles of Lancaster county roads on the State plan will be resurfaced this year.

George Brubaker, 69 years old, of Spruce Hill, committed suicide by hanging in the barn at his home Sunday night. He was shot by the Public Service Commission this week for Harrisburg, Erie, Pittsburgh and Philadelphia.

Frederick Alcorn Hays, supervisor of the Sunbury & Lewisburg divisions of the Pennsylvania Railroad, was retired at the age of 65.

Walter Lyon, of Pittsburgh, was inducted into office as United States District Attorney for Western Pennsylvania by Judge Orr.

John McCaskey, 50, was burned to a crisp and another man was seriously injured when a shanty they occupied at Woods Sand Bank, near Sharps, was destroyed by fire during the night.

A number of old apple orchards in Blair county are being cut down and the apple wood sold to be used as saw handles. Apple wood is used extensively for this purpose.

At the instance of the state board of health, information was made against Dr. F. A. Belland, Sharon, Pa., Dr. O. O. Bashline, Horner, and W. F. Bowman, Grove City, osteopaths, charging them with practicing medicine and surgery without a license. All waived a hearing and were held for court.

Laura M. Prosser, of Mt. Union, has been awarded \$9,000 for the death of her husband, who was killed by a Pennsylvania railroad train in the Mechanicsburg crossing as a carpenter October 25, 1919. After action for damages had been brought in New York state, also under Federal control, a compromise agreement was reached. Under Pennsylvania compensation laws, the widow would have received \$3,500.

Government prohibition agents reported to headquarters that they had confiscated a 20-gallon still which was found behind the organ in a Croatian Sunday school room at Adersley, Patton township. The still was in operation, the agents said, adding that they arrested John Trubak, while he was in the act of draining some liquor from the apparatus.

Ten thousand residents of Lancaster county paid income tax this year. One paid one cent and another two cents. The tax fell off only \$10,000 from last year, the receipts being \$632,400.

#### COUNTY GRANTED \$133 IN STATE ROAD REWARDS

HARRISBURG—The State Highway Department Saturday announced inspection of roads in second-class townships had been completed in Dauphin, Cambria, Venango, Greene, Montgomery, Lancaster, Jefferson, Erie, Delaware, Clearfield and Chester counties.

State rewards were granted to the amount of \$13,853.08, it was announced.

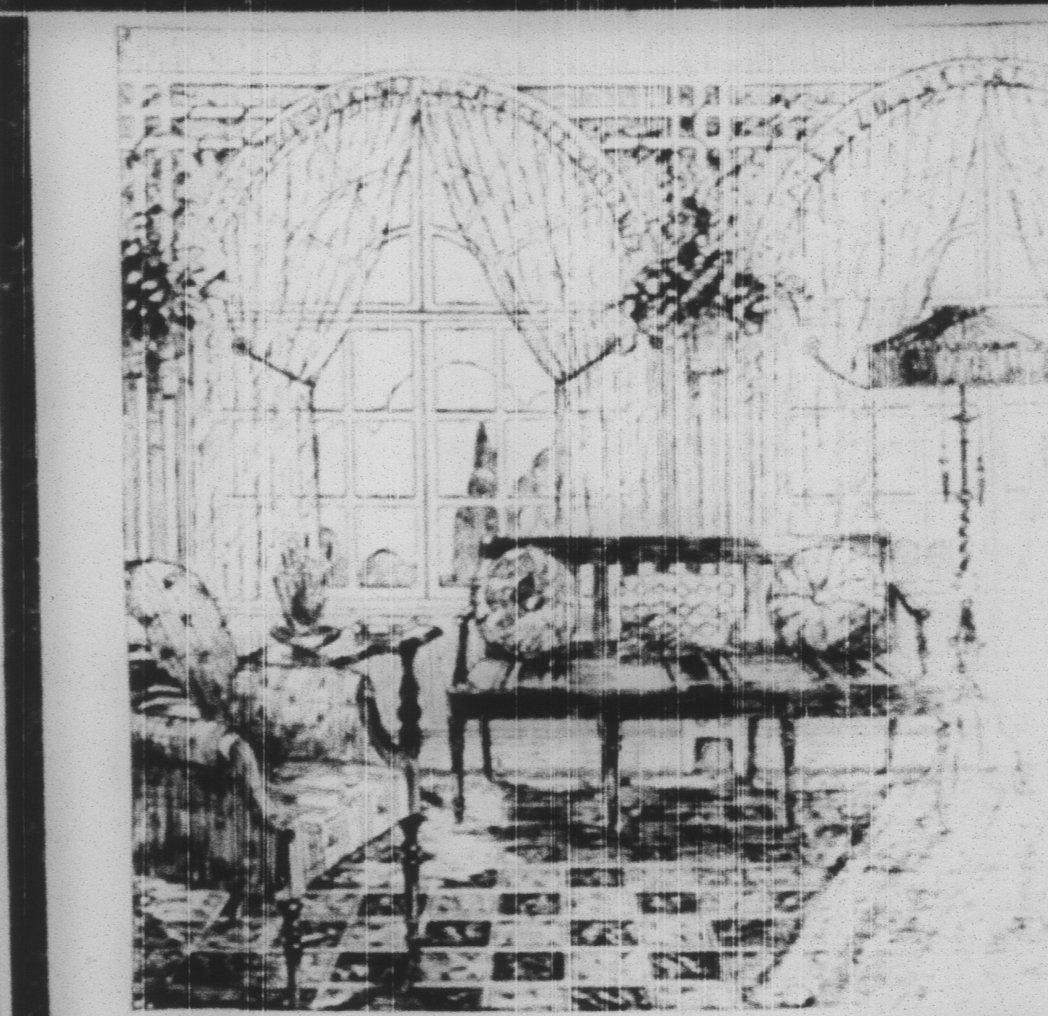

The building that formerly housed the toll gate at Ebenburg and owned by a Mrs. Bishop of Ebenburg was destroyed.

#### AMERICAN LEGION NEWS

A gain of forty-four posts of the American Legion and ninety-three units of its Women's Auxiliary was made during the week ending March 12. Missouri Department of the Legion led with five posts chartered and Massachusetts and Kansas reported twelve and eleven new units, respectively of the Auxiliary. There are now 10,272 Legion posts and 2,292 units of the Women's Auxiliary.

ordered the Kansas Department of that organization to make a thorough investigation of the recent outrage at Great Bend, Kan., in which two organizers of the Non-Partisan League were tarred and feathered. Although the most of residents of that vicinity included a number of ex-service men, there was no organized support from Legion posts, according to press correspondents. Colonel Galbraith ordered all Legion posts to refrain from interference with the political activities of the Non-Partisan League several months ago.

The increased cost of railroad fare will not trouble the members of Superior, Wis., post of the American Legion, who will attend the next Legion state convention at Eau Claire in box cars. "We traveled France in side-door Pullmans and we believe that we prefer the Yankee type of box cars to riding the velvet at present prices," the Legionnaires said.

The California Department of the American Legion has received copies of a resolution adopted by the Central Labor Council, San Bernardino, Cal., recommending adequate appropriations for the bureau caring for disabled veterans, appropriations to build and maintain necessary hospitals and passage of the Rogers-Capper bill to consolidate the government bureaus dealing with the affairs of ex-service men, as endorsed by the Legion.

Graves of 150 Civil War veterans will be provided with markers by Kent Vowles Post of the American Legion at Ellettsville, Ind. To raise funds for the undertaking, the Legionnaires will give a banquet of "banquet" prepared by former Army cooks belonging to the post. Ellettsville Legion members are also backing a movement to establish a public library.
