FIREMAN IS KILLED AND TRAIN DERAILED

New York Express Badly Wrecked Near Gallitzin; Few Passengers Injured.

ENGINEER BADLY HURT

GALLITZIN—One man was killed, another seriously injured, about 10 o'clock last Wednesday night, when the New York Express on the Pennsylvania Railroad, en route from Pittsburgh to New York, was derailed at Bennington. The locomotive, four coaches and the baggage and mail car left the rails, two coaches piling up. Three sleeping cars left the rails, but remained upright.

Earl Wines, of Perry, the fireman, was found dead beneath the wreckage.

Andrew J. Dunmore, of Irwin, the engineer, was seriously injured and is in a critical condition in the Altoona Hospital.

R. Mickle, of New Jersey, the baggage-man, suffered a fractured nose. Prepared for any emergency, the Pennsylvania officials at Altoona rushed a special relief train carrying physicians, Red Cross and other nurses, priests, special equipment and police to the scene, but Gallitzin physicians had taken care of Engineer Dunmore, giving first aid. Passengers injured were treated by the Altoona physicians.

Mr. Dunmore was taken to Altoona on the relief train and rushed to the Altoona Hospital. His right leg is broken, his left foot badly hurt, both arms and hands horribly scalded from the blow to the finger tips.

His face was badly scalded and it is believed he is otherwise injured.

The wreck was one of the most serious and yet miraculous in the history of the company. The steel coaches, in the belief of many, saved a horrible death list. Windows were broken, seats turned topsy turvy but passengers were left uninjured. The vestibules, strongly built of the finest steel, bore the brunt of the crashes and, although badly dented and twisted, saved the remainder of the coach from any great damage.

The baggage coach plowed ahead,

one length and a half ahead of the engine's position before it came to a halt, with the trucks off, it listing heavily to the left. The first coach, remaining over the ties and turning up the rails, ran to the right of the baggage car, leaning to the right. The two following coaches remained almost upright, but were badly damaged. No windows, however, remained in these cars.

The first car and the baggage and mail car were very badly damaged, with the coach having practically every window broken. It was in this car that immediately following the wreck, sleeping passengers were piled up with baggage that fell from the neck. Mothers with babies in their arms were scattered, but uninjured. Passengers quickly made their exit from the wreck and the one following to the rear coaches which were still upright, met in danger of falling over.

Cool, nerve and quick witted passengers and the crew, displayed good judgment, quitted all baggage and then began search for the injured. The engine, lying on its side, partly down over the bank, with its huge nose almost against one of the derailed coaches, had emitted great quantities of scalding water and the rescuers suffered wet feet, while searching for the engineer and fireman. Tallow candles and the lanterns were used the men searched the field.

BARNESBORO MAN FATALLY INJURED

John Grace's Wife Patient at Spangler Hospital When He Was Admitted.

As the result of severe injuries sustained Thursday morning, when he was caught under a fall of rock, John Grace, aged 45 years, of Barnesboro, an employee of the Lennox Coal Company, died at the Miners' Hospital, Spangler, about 12:15 o'clock, noon Friday. His death occurred about two hours after his admission to the hospital. Grace had his left leg fractured and badly crushed and suffered internal injuries.

The deceased's wife, who is a patient in the Spangler Hospital, where she recently underwent an operation, when her husband was admitted yesterday. Mrs. Grace was removed to her home shortly before her husband died. Grace is survived by his widow and seven children, also two brothers.

Funeral services were held Saturday morning in the Polish Catholic church. Interment was made in the church cemetery.
