Miss Alice Lloyd, a teacher in the local schools for the past 50 years, was not an applicant for re-election and her name was not filled at the meeting.

SUMS APPROPRIATED HOSPITALS REDUCED

State appropriations for Johnston hospitals and the Christian Home and the hospital at Spangler, as approved by Gov. Sproul, show reductions from the recommendations by the state board. The estimate of the Memorial was pared from \$100,000 to \$72,000; Mercy, from \$72,000 to \$50,000; the Christian Home from \$6,000 to \$5,000. The allotment for the Memorial hospital, Spangler, was reduced from \$15,000 to \$14,500.

WILL BUILD PERMANENT ROAD AT MUNSTER.

The Cambria County Board of Commissioners Friday authorized the advertising of bids for the construction of 16,520 feet of permanent improved highway at Munster to the intersection of the William Penn Highway at Lake Rowena.

It does not change the judicial districts of the State. Originally the bill dropped one judge from Chester county. This was done at the behest of Senator Kyrle but the House refused to concentrate in this change.

I give, bequeath and devise unto my wife, Leta A. White, in complete and perfect ownership of all my rights and property of every kind and nature, whether real, personal or mixed, whatever situated, appointing her executor of my estate, without bond and giving her herein thereof."
