Major J. H. Ailport of Barnesboro and party were Patton visitors Wednesday, in the Major's 90-horsepower Thomas Flyer.

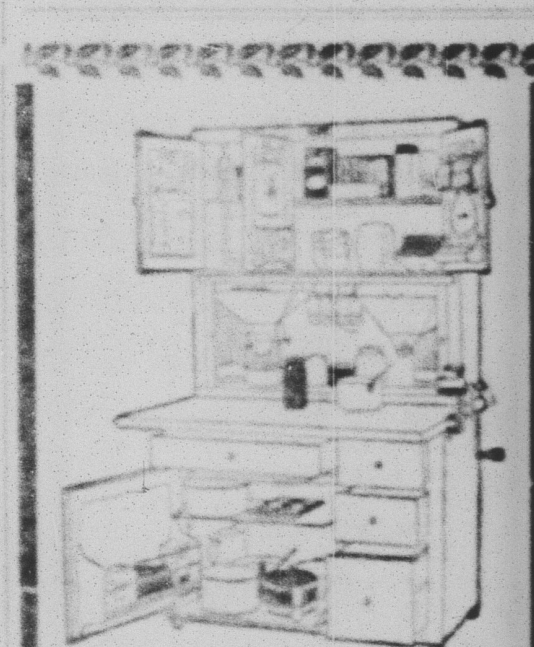
