Patton will cross bats with the strong Colver team at the Fair Grounds in Carrolltown next Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock. The Colver team has had a

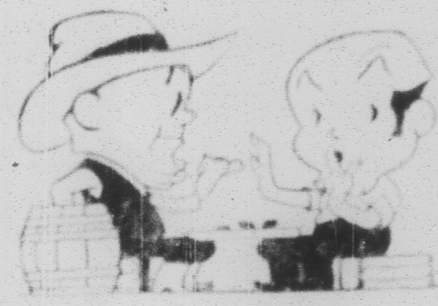
very successful year having won 21 out of 25 games played. The season's work of them with teams of more than ordinary renown. The game next Sunday promises to be a highly contested one.
