30 New Patients at Cresson. CRESSION.—There were 30 new patients admitted to the local State Sanatorium here Thursday, of which number 11 are veterans of the World War. There are now 690 patients at the institution.

These ex-service men will be transferred the latter part of October to Mt. Alto Sanatorium. The Veterans' Bureau has closed a contract with the State Department of Health whereby it will take over 200 beds at the institution for the care of ex-service men. These beds will be turned over to the Veterans' Bureau on November 1. The Veterans' Bureau is now collecting all ex-service men in the three State sanatoriums to fill these beds.

Work has been started here on the construction of the new sun porch and parlors at the sanatorium.

BODY OF HERMAN WARNER RETURNED TO HASTINGS. The body of Herman Warner, a World War veteran, arrived at Hastings Monday and was taken to the home of the deceased's sister, Mrs. Regina Lantzy. Light Vote Polled Probably Due to Condition of the Weather.

The results of the Primary Tuesday show the nomination of Evans and Saylor for Judge on the Republican ticket. Keller, of Johnstown, is the candidate for Sheriff. Evans and Saylor will be opposed by John McLean, of Ebensburg, and Harry Doer, of Johnstown, on the Democratic ticket.

John L. Evans has obtained the nomination for Poor Director and P. W. Smith won by a margin of 100 votes over Jim Durn, his nearest competitor, for Jury Commissioner. Figures on Democratic candidates for poor director and Jury commissioner are incomplete.

Primary day last Tuesday in Patton Borough did not by any means attract all the voters of either party, probably due in part to the weather conditions of the day. Evans led the field here for the Judgeship nomination, and Stephens and Weiner were close for second place. Keller took honors for sheriff. 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Highway Commissioner Writes Committee on Route 62

Harrisburg, Pa., Sept. 12, 1921. MR. JAMES A. MCCLAIN, SPANGLER, PA.

MY DEAR MR. MCCLAIN: In response to your request this morning at the conference held in this office with respect to the construction of State Highway Route No. 62, I am writing in order that your citizens who have been interested in this improvement may know the exact situation and the reasons for our failure to advertise it.

The plans have finally been completed and the contracts affecting the various interests involved have been executed in proper form. The records of this office indicate that it is proposed to finance this improvement through the contribution of fifty per cent of the cost by the County and fifty per cent by the State.

This appropriation is payable out of the General Fund, but the revenues paid into the Treasury have not been sufficient thus far to enable us to obligate the State for the amount payable by it under the contracts.

This is an embarrassing situation to you and in a condition which affects many similar projects in the State. When the Treasury shall have received into the General Fund the revenues provided for by the legislative enactment this Department will then be in position to advertise this project for construction.

I am sincerely trusting that your people will continue to be patient as to the progress thus far made with reference to this improvement.

The Committee that called on Mr. Sadler on Monday of last week have absolute confidence that Mr. Sadler is acting in good faith as to route No. 62, Spangler to Carrolltown, and just as soon as funds appropriated at the last Session of the Legislature are available Mr. Sadler will advertise for a letting. While Mr. Sadler does not in his letter commit himself to advertise in the October letting he verbally told the Committee he thought he could. However, it is not material whether he advertises in October or November or even December, as work could not be done or even commenced now. Being a re-enforced concrete job, this class of work cannot be done in freezing or even frosty weather. The route will be advertised and under contract for early spring work. With a little more patience your road improvement aspiration will be gratified.

JUDGMENT IS GIVEN AGAINST POOR BOARD. A judgment in favor of George G. Viering, Johnstown undertaker, in the sum of \$285, was given by Alderman Carl G.
