Star on Lafayette Team Here on Sunday and Monday

Frank Schwab, the local young man who has been acting captain on the Lafayette football team for some time and who has become one of the star football players in the scholastic circles of the east, was a visitor among friends and relatives here on Sunday and Monday, leaving here on Monday afternoon for Kiski, where he will coach the team of that institution for a few days.

Lafayette has had a very successful season, having won every game they have played to date this season. Only two more games remain on the Lafayette calendar, one with Dickinson State on Saturday of this week and the other with the University of Lehigh on November 19th. Mr. Schwab is of the opinion that Lafayette will win both these games and make a season's clean-up.

Mr. and Mrs. Edward Fry Observe Anniversary

CRESSON—Mr and Mrs. Edward Fry of this place, recently celebrated their 55th wedding anniversary. A solemn high mass was said by the Rev. James Graven, in St. Francis Xavier Catholic Church. Their children were home to add joy to this happy occasion, and during the day friends from near and far called to offer hearty congratulations.

Edward Fry and Judith Ann Callahan were married by Father Edward Burns at St. Augustine. They lived in Chest Springs for a time, and later on a farm near Loretto, from which they moved to Cresson, where Mr. Fry engaged in the wholesale flour and feed business, retiring about four years ago. His daughter, Miss Lynn Fry, died became a member of the firm and takes an active part in the management of the business.

Mr. Fry enlisted in the Civil War in 1864 at the age of 17 years. He was a member of Company A, 12th Regiment, and took part in the following battles: Drury Bluff, Petersburg; Cold Harbor, where 10,000 men were lost in five minutes; and later in another battle at Petersburg, where he was wounded in the right shoulder. He was taken to the hospital at Fort Monroe, from which he was removed to McClelland Hospital in Philadelphia, where he remained until honorably discharged on February 8, 1868.

Mr. Fry is a director of the Farmers' Deposit Bank at Cresson. He is an intelligent and progressive citizen, and with the staunch support of his estimable wife takes an active part in all welfare work of the community.

SENATE KNOCKS OUT SALES TAX

WASHINGTON—The sales tax was rejected Thursday by the senate. The Democrats voted solidly against the tax and were joined by 17 Republicans.

The vote 43 against to 22 for, was on a proposal by Senator Smoot, Republican, Utah, for a 1 percent levy with exemptions provided in the case of sales by farmers of the products of their farms, sales by public utilities and sales by the United States or any foreign government or any state or territory, the army and navy and hospitals.

McCann and Evans Win Judicial Contest In Cambria County at Election Tuesday

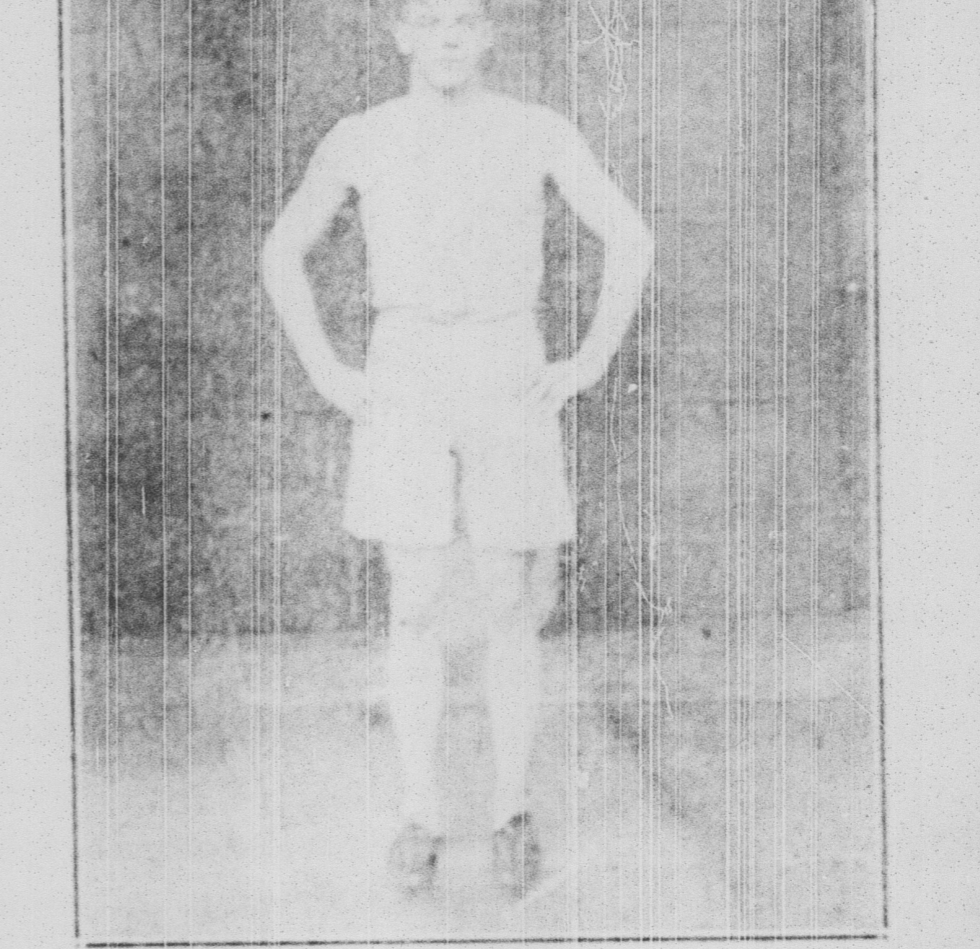
Prominent Ebensburg Democrat's Remarkable Run Surprises His Friends. Balance of Republicans Winners.

John H. McCann, Esq., of Ebensburg, secured the greatest triumph ever scored by a Democrat in Cambria county since the days when A. V. Baines, ex-judge Johnson, was the Democratic nominee for Tuesday's election. McCann led the judicial candidates on the ticket, with a total of 10,000 votes.

The McCannes have secured a fine record in the county. McCann's law office is in Ebensburg, Pa. He is a member of the Pennsylvania bar and has been admitted to practice in several states. He is also a member of the American Bar Association.

The only question being asked was whether the balance of the ticket would be carried by the Republicans. The answer was in the affirmative. The balance of the ticket was carried by the Republicans, with the exception of the judgeship, which was won by McCann.

McCann's friends in Ebensburg completely filled his offices on Tuesday night. A crowd of thousands gathered outside his residence, and the celebration continued until dawn. McCann is a well-known and popular figure in the county.

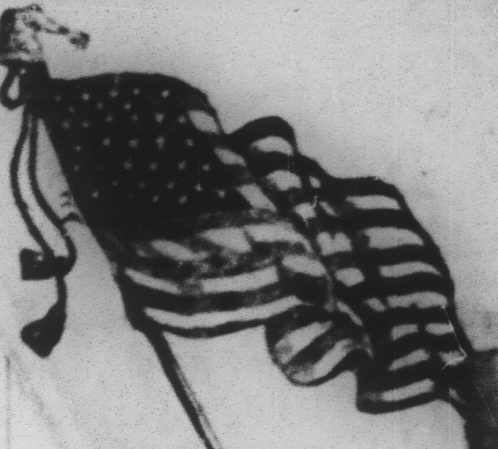
REV. DONEHO NAMED AS STATE LIBRARIAN
