Stella, the 15 year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. August Taylor, of Kerr Avenue, died on Tuesday at 2 p. m. after an illness of over a month suffering from typhoid fever.

A. C. Fisher, the painter, has just completed a room on the new St. Boniface Catholic church and parsonage.

Wm. McConnell, a young man about 17 years of age, who resides near Patton, is down with typhoid fever.

John Myers, Left Home - GALLITZIN--On Sunday morning, between 8 and 9 o'clock, John (Foker) Myers, aged 65 years, went from his home at this place, presumably for his morning walk, and has not been seen or heard from since.

Mr. Myers is an unusually tall man, being six feet and one inch in height. He is slightly stooped-shouldered, due no doubt to his advanced age, and the face that he was injured in the mines here two years ago, which left him physically in such condition that he has been unable to work since. At the time he disappeared, he was attired in a blue coat and black trousers, and wore a black derby hat. He also carried a cane.

When Mr. Myers failed to return at noon Sunday, his family became alarmed, and at 4 o'clock a party of men started out in search of him. Meeting with no success, they re-turned and organized another party, composed largely of ex-service men, who scoured the woods around the town in a systematic manner. They met with no better success, however, than the first party. The search is being continued.

The aged man's family is unable to determine why he left home in this manner. It is feared that he over-taxed himself and may have suffered a stroke of paralysis, or have met with an accident. He made his home with his wife and daughter, and has several married children residing in Gallitzin.

John Hyland Dies at Memorial NANTY-GLO--John Hyland, aged 22, a native of Scotland, who had been living here for some time, died in the Memorial Hospital, Johnstown, as a result of injuries received Thursday at the Springfield Coal company mine near here. In his haste to get out of the way of a string of coal cars, Mr. Hyland fell and seven cars passed over him, fracturing his spine and three ribs. A blood transfusion was performed in an effort to save his life but the operation failed to revive him.

Mr. Hyland was married to Max Margaret McDermitt, of Nanty-Glo, last July. His parents are living in Scotland, there being but one relative, a sister, Mrs. Joseph Hayes, of Nanty-Glo, living in this country. Funeral services were held Wednesday morning from the St. Mary's Catholic Church with a high requiem mass by the Rev. Father Michael O'Donnor. The funeral was in charge of the local post of the American Legion, of which Mr. Hyland was a member. Interment was made in the Holy Name Cemetery at Ebensburg.

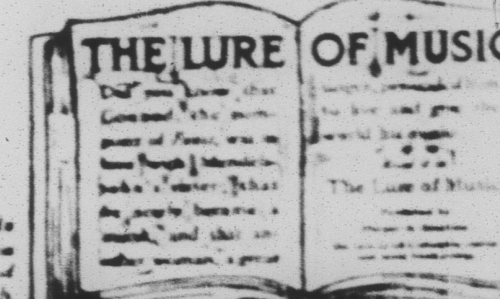
