State Calls Attention to the Various Hunting Laws

Regardless of the fact that a great deal of publicity has been given to changes in the game laws during the past six months, it is probable that many sportsmen are still waiting to see what the new laws mean. It is therefore, in the interest of sportsmen, that the Game Commission has issued a pamphlet, which will be mailed to all sportsmen, about the 15th of October, 1921, as heretofore, instead of the season of 1921-22. As the law now stands, it is absolutely necessary for every licensed sportsman to carry his license on his person and to display the license tag on the outer garment on the middle of the back at all times while hunting. Sportsmen must not forget to countersign their license as it is not valid until signed. The penalty for failure to carry the license or display the tag is \$20.00.

The Game Commission by a recent Act of Assembly is given the power to revoke hunters' licenses for periods of one to five years for violations of the game laws, carelessness with firearms, destroying personal property on lands on which licenses are hunting, etc. All true sportsmen are requested to see to it that the game laws are obeyed at all times and that hunters appreciate the fact that the wild owners of the State are their hosts and govern themselves accordingly.

Shooting a person in mistake for game while hunting is now punishable by fines from \$100.00 to \$1,000.00 and imprisonment from 1 year to 5 years, also refusal to grant a license for 2 years to 10 years.

Shooting with bullets in the hunting territory during the upland game season, except at legal birds or animals or targets protected by a natural or artificial barrier so that the bullet can not go more than 15 yards beyond the target aimed at, is punishable by a fine of \$25.00 for each shot fired.

Persons hunting together for large game must keep a roster of the camp or hunting party on which the name, address and license number of each member of the party is given. Large game and most birds must be taken within 24 hours after killing, with the name, address, and license number of the party killing same and the location where same was killed.

The distribution of the pamphlet containing the Game, Fish and Forest laws cannot be made until about November 1st because of the printer's strike last summer which delayed all State printing. With the splendid news of the newspapers of the State, we have been able to largely overcome this serious handicap, and the people of the State are quite thoroughly familiar with the changes in the law, of which the above are the most important.


