

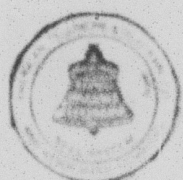
The Oldest Industry

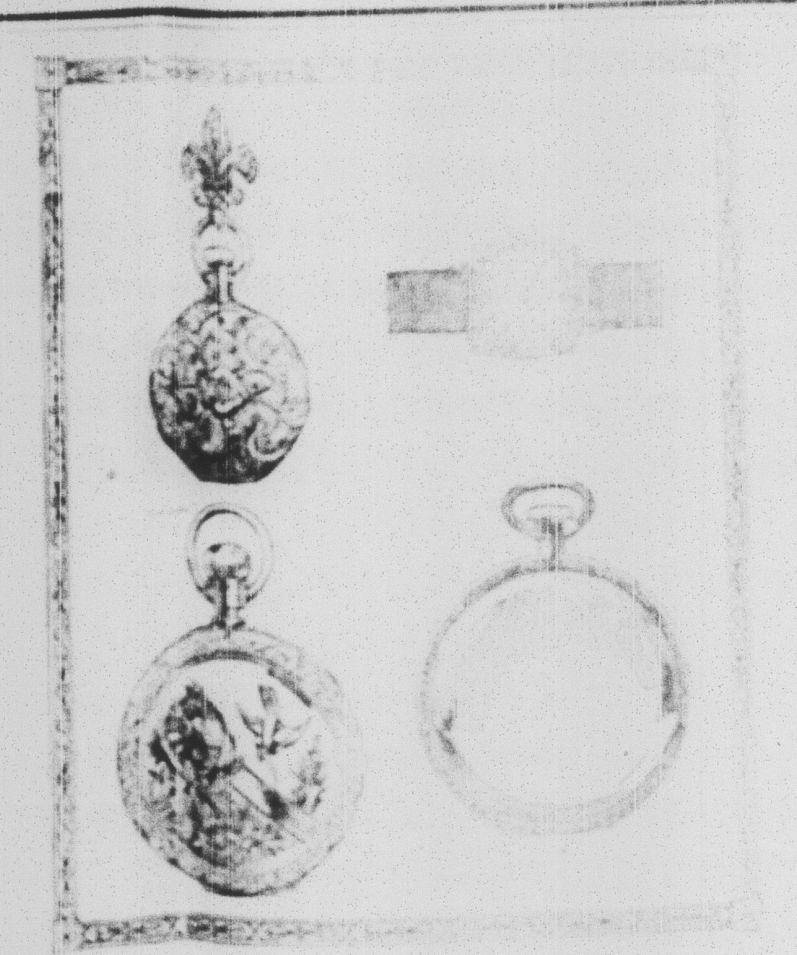
