Official Notification of Action
Announcement has been received at the Johnstown Veterans' Bureau concerning the action of the Government in extending the time limit for reinstatement of Government War Risk Insurance, from December 31, which was to be the final day, until March 1, 1922. This important communication was forwarded at once to the Johnstown headquarters of the American Red Cross, which has been assisting servicemen in obtaining reinstatement of this kind of insurance.
Reinstatement can either be made at the Veterans' Bureau or at the Red Cross, it was announced. Miss Mary Stacey, of the Johnstown Red Cross headquarters, said that this extension of the time limit will be of considerable benefit to the former soldier living in this district as well as to those residing in other parts of the country. She stated that the Government War Risk Insurance is cheaper than regular insurance because of the fact that the Government is standing all running expenses in the case of some.

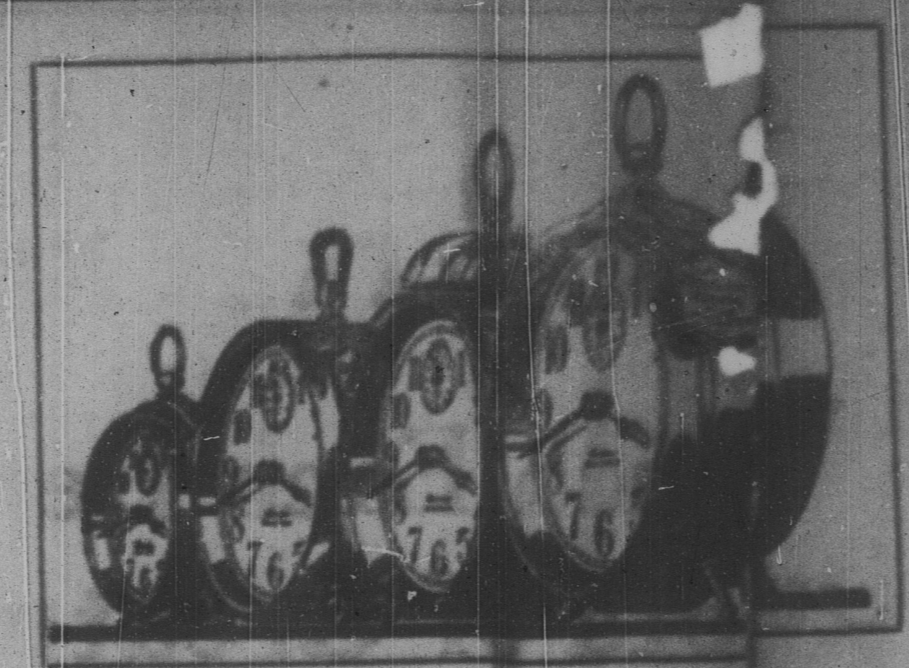

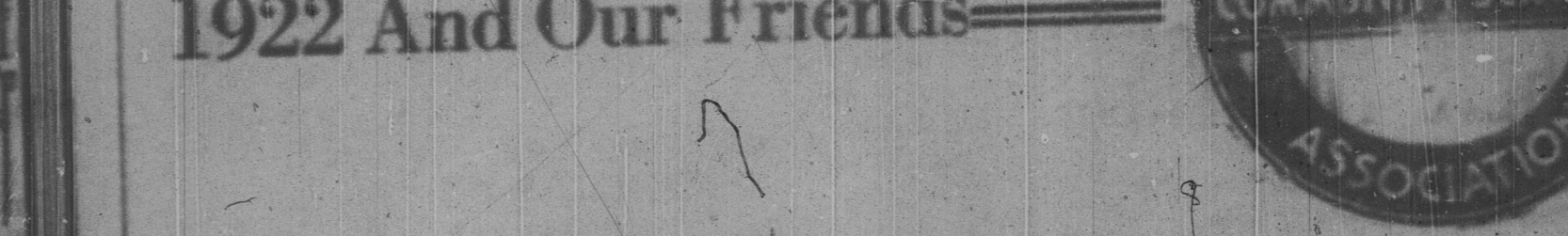
