Hines, Ebenburg, and seconded by Mr. Glass, of Cresson, was adopted to look into the advisability of organizing a mail carriers council of all postal employees in the county.

GETS POSITION**

Judge Evans Vacates the Appointment Made by Former Judge.

**RENEWING**—Judge John E. Evans last to-day Tuesday in taking the action expected from him as to a probation officer for Camden County. Declining the appointment heretofore made of probation officer to be newly created, he named Miss Marie Jacques, of Johnston, to the position. E. H. Koss was made chief probation officer, in view of his position as warden of the county jail. Mr. Evans agrees without comment, but Miss Jacques is appointed "at a compensation and allowance previously fixed by the court for such office." The salary is understood to be \$125 a month.
