Belleville, Pa.—Appearing outwardly calm and making no statement as to his guilt, Marshall Tillman, of Johnstown, colored, walked to the electric chair at 7:13 o'clock Monday morning and five minutes later was pronounced dead, paying the death penalty for the murder of his wife about a year ago and for which he was convicted in the Cambria County courts. Tillman was accompanied on his final journey by Tyson Chaplain Young and while the electrodes were being applied was silent and seemed to take little interest in what was going on about him. Five minutes later he was pronounced dead by Prison Physician Campbell.

Shelly, aged 59 years and 7 months, one of the earliest settlers in this vicinity and "the grand old man" of Wilmore, died suddenly at 4 o'clock Monday afternoon at the Shelly home, due to over-exertion as the result of an hour's strenuous work chopping in the yard. Leading an active life for almost 30 years, the passing of Alexander J. Shelly came as this well-known pioneer had always wished for, an end without sickness or infirmity. In good health, despite his "four score and six," Squire Shelly went to the rear yard and was engaged for more than an hour in cutting wood. Retaining shortly before 4 o'clock, he entered the house and complained of a pain in the back. A few minutes later he was pronounced dead by Prison Physician Campbell.

AGED DUNLO WOMAN IS RENDERED UNCONSCIOUS

DUNLO.—Mrs. James Kay, aged about 72 years, of this place, suffered a concussion of the brain Wednesday of last week, when she fell from a chair and struck her head against a door frame. She was rendered unconscious and did not revive until several hours later. A family physician was summoned and rendered medical attention.

New Quarters for Board of Viewers

It is understood that the Cambria County Board of Commissioners will provide for suitable quarters in Johnstown to care for the permanent Board of viewers since the Judge's Chambers have been discontinued in the Flood City. County Triennial Assessment Starts

The triennial assessment for Cambria County is now under way and an extra force of clerks have been secured to perform the task. It is expected that there will be a large increase in the total assessment for the county, the present valuation being \$100,000,000. County Engineer H. F. Dorr also has been instructed to make a complete survey of the mines in the county, as heretofore there has been no way of telling the valuation of mining properties in this county.

300 Are Naturalized

145 Want Licenses
