### CHEST SPRINGS NOTES

### APPOINTMENTS BY COURT

School Directors and Mine Examining Board Appointed.

EBENSBURG.—Upon petition of M. S. Bunn, superintendent of schools in Cambria County, Francis H. Bunn and Edward Melhorn Monday were appointed school directors for Ashland independent school district for a period of six years, their term of office having expired the first Monday of December, 1921.

The court appointed John Ira Thomas, mine inspector of the Thirtieth bituminous district, and Thomas F. Curry and John Williams, all of Cambria County, as a board to examine all applicants for certification of qualifications as mine foremen, assistant mine foremen and fire bosses in the Thirtieth bituminous district of Pennsylvania. The commission of the board expires May 15, 1923.

### GEO. B. McMULLEN FUNERAL MONDAY

George B. McMullen died last Friday night at the home of his sister in Allegheny, of a complication of illnesses. He was born May 5, 1865, in Cambria County. The body was taken in Coopers where funeral services were held Monday morning at 10:00 o'clock in the Coopers Catholic Church. Burial was in the church cemetery.

### FIRE DESTROYS THE TOMR FROM FACTORY

A brown factory, owned by G. Clark Tapp, of Johnstown, caught fire about 12:30 o'clock Friday and was entirely destroyed. It was valued at \$2,200. It is said the cause of the conflagration was due to a faulty fire running from a small coal strip in the factory.

About 15 bales of brown corn and several dozen brooms were saved from the burning building. Firemen called to the scene were hampered in their work because of frozen water plugs.

### LILLY MINER HURT IN MINE ACCIDENT

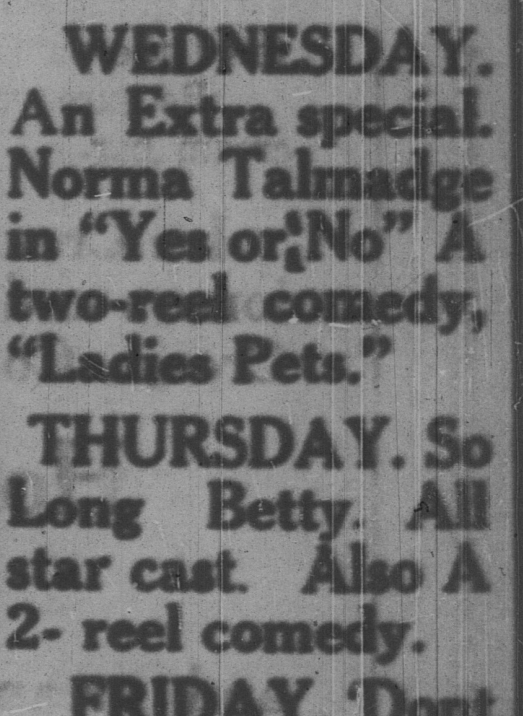
