F. W. Gels began his twentieth year as cashier of the Maryland First National Bank.

More than 50,000 young trees were given away by the State Forestry Department at county fairs, teachers' institutes and similar gatherings in 1921, according to State Forestry authorities.

Orders were issued Wednesday by the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western for a resumption of work in all shops

on the system until further orders. The shops have been closed since December 23. Fourteen hundred men are affected and 1,200 in the shops at East Buffalo and Kingland, N. Y.

Master painters and decorators of the State are holding their thirty-fourth annual convention at York.

The Evans colliery at Beaver Meadow resumed after a suspension dating from December 24 last.

Northumberland County Common Pleas Court opened with 105 cases on the list, the largest number since the county was organized.

The Allegheny Window Glass plant will resume operation in Port Allegheny, February 1, and give employment to 200 men, nearly all of them skilled trades. This is a "band" plant that has been idle 13 months.

Struck by a piece of limestone thrown out by a blast at the Thompsonville Lime & Stone Company's quarry, at York, Nick Alphonse had all of his front teeth knocked out.

H. Gordon Hinkle, city manager of Altoona, who will retire from office Monday, when straight commission government will be substituted, has been offered the position of city manager of Columbus, Ga.

The Juniata Valley, Klamming, coal highway tax and baggage line has filed a tariff increasing the present rates between different points 20 per cent.

State highway administration districts have been cut from 19 to 15.

Three districts have been built up and added to other districts, J. L. Moore, Schuykill, McKean, Wyoming, Cumberland and some Juniata Valley districts being among those shifted.

Installments of the state treasury reached a new high figure during December, the aggregate amount being \$2,500,000.

The revenue for the month amounted to \$18,884,470, of which \$11,000,000 came from the sale of road bonds. The aggregate of all balances at the end of Decem-

ber business, including proceeds of the bond sales, was \$17,200,581.

The Pressed Steel Car Company has filed a tariff with the public service commission decreasing the rate for electric current for street lighting from 25 cents per arc lamp per night, or \$41.25 a year, to \$30 a year for 100-watt tungsten lamps. The new tariff will affect the village of Preston and Stone Township, Allegheny County.

Berk County Commissioners will insist that women pay their taxes, and has notified collectors to proceed by law.

Belleville received two 750-gallon pumps for fire protection which will be tested out by the Underwriters' Association.

The will of Miss Harriet Hoover, Snydertown, who died last week, gives \$1200 to the Lloyd J. Theisler Orphans' Home at Loyville.

Auditor General Samuel B. Lowe has announced the appointments of mercantile appraisers for practically all of the counties of the state under the act of 1919, the appointments for Allegheny and Philadelphia, which are under other acts, to be made later.
