**Tuesday, May 16, is Spring Primary Date:**

**HARRISBURG.**—General instructions for political candidates, committees and voters for the primary and general elections of 1922, and details from the acts governing personal registration, uniform primaries, party enrollment and corrupt practices, are carried in the pamphlet prepared by George D. Thorn, Chief of the Election Bureau of the State Department, which is now in the printer's hands. The 1922 pamphlet carries in detail the political calendar of 1922 and the new apportionment of Congressional, Senatorial and Representative districts, which becomes effective for the first time this year through changes made by the 1921 Legislature.

At the primary elections to be held Tuesday, May 16, Republican, Democratic, Socialist and Prohibition candidates are to be chosen for United States Senator, Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of Internal Affairs, one Representative in Congress from each of the 36 Congressional districts; one Senator in the State Legislature in each even-numbered Senatorial district, and 203 members of House of Representatives. At the primary election each party will select its State committees, with each Senatorial district entitled to two members, except where a Senatorial district is composed of more than one county, in which event each county is entitled to elect one State committee.

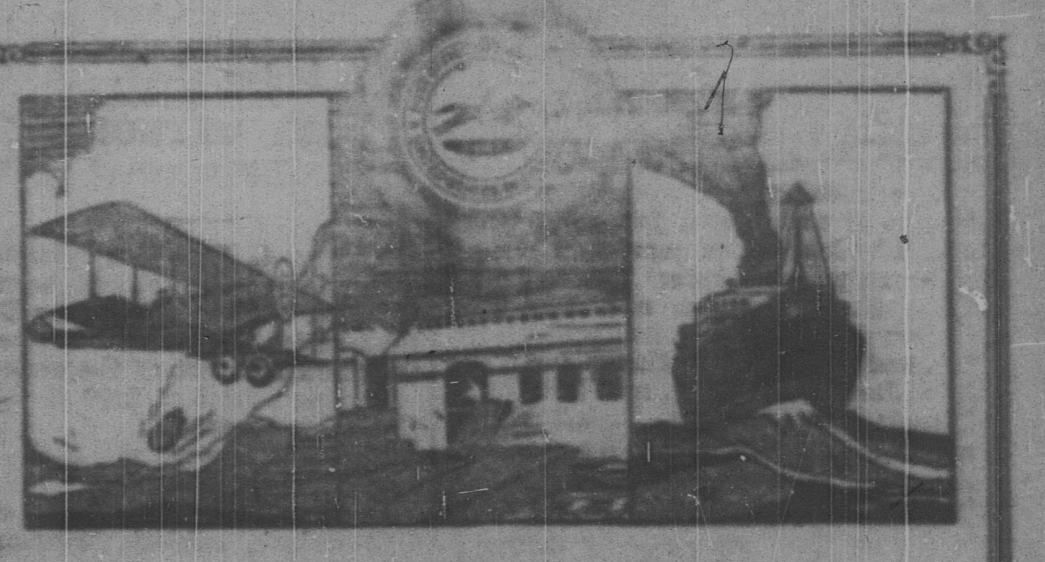

William Maxwell, aged 33 years, died at the State Hospital at Harrisburg three hours after he was caught under his engine at the Cranberry mines, when the locomotive left the tracks on a 25-foot high trestle and plunged into a drainage channel. The Pennsylvania Power & Light Company has filed with the Public Service Commission to become effective February 15, 1922, a supplement to its electric tariff P. S. C. No. 22, providing a rate schedule for water pumping in the Mt. Carmel and Shamokin districts. The Public Service Commission dismissed the complaint of S. S. Staples against the White Haven Water Company, Luzerne County. The company had protested against the increase in rates since the borough sold the water works to the White Haven Water Company. Savings of \$2,000 are claimed by New Kensington councilmen as a result of salary adjustments of borough employees. Burgess Daniel Burns will receive an annual salary of \$2,000 instead of fees for police court hearings. Wages of policemen have been cut from \$140 to \$125 a month and street laborers' pay reduced to 25 cents an hour.
