Total Production of Coal for Year 3,644,634 Tons, Report Shows.

INSPECTOR WARDROP SUBMITS REPORT

State Mine Inspector W. B. Wardrop, of the 15th Bituminous district, has just completed his annual report for the Department of Mines for the year 1921, as tabulated by him from the operators' reports.

INSPECTOR WARDROP SUBMITS REPORT

The production of coal for the year to be 3,644,634 tons. Of this tonnage, 2,946,209 was mined by electric machines, 15,645 by compressed air machines and 1,579,774 by pick mining.

There are 4 gaseous mines in the district and two of the fatal accidents were caused by an explosion of gas in Watkins No. 3 mine.

J. E. Schwab Passes Away

One of Original Carnegie Partners; Ex-Head of Steel Company.

Joseph E. Schwab, aged 57, brother of Charles M. Schwab, steel magnate, expired Saturday at the Schwab residence, New York City, following a long illness of a complication of diseases. All his relatives were at the bedside when the final summons came, including Charles M. Schwab and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John A. Schwab, venerable residents of Loretto, Pa., who celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary last April.

Joseph E. Schwab was born 57 years ago at Loretto, where his parents have resided for more than 60 years. He joined the Carnegie Steel Company two years after his brother, Charles M. Schwab, became identified with that concern. Since that time the Messrs. Schwab have been closely associated in various business enterprises.

Joseph E. Schwab is survived by his parents, his widow and two children, his assistant. Two years later he became president of the American Steel Foundries Co. and after a few years retired from active participation in industrial projects.

The body was taken to Loretto Monday morning arriving at Cresson at 7:30 o'clock. From Cresson to funeral party drove overland to Loretto where the funeral took place 166m St. Michael's Catholic church at 9 o'clock. Following a solemn high mass of requiem interment was made in the family plot in the church cemetery.
