The Lead Letter Office has been in existence since 1889.

Today people are addressing letters to John Smith, New York, N. Y., or Chicago, Ill., thinking Uncle Sam can locate him, which is just as incomplete as was Zeke's address of yore.

The Postoffice Department asks you to get the number and street in the address. It helps you.

MORE BUSINESS IN GOVERNMENT

This apt phrase was used in President Harding's first message to Congress.

ORDINANCE NO. 151

An Ordinance of the Borough of Patton authorizing the grading, paving and curbing of Fourth avenue from Beech avenue north to the north side of McIntyre avenue, and providing for the collection of the cost of the same.

Section 1. Be it enacted and ordained by the Burgess and Town Council of Patton Borough, and it is hereby enacted and ordained by authority of the same:

That whereas two-thirds of the property owners, representing not less than two-thirds in number of feet of properties fronting or abutting on Fourth avenue, between Beech avenue and McIntyre avenue, have presented their petition to Council, asking that said street be properly graded, curbed and paved with verified paving bricks or blocks;

Therefore, it is enacted and ordained that said street, beginning at Beech avenue and extending north to the north side of McIntyre avenue, be properly graded, curbed and paved with verified paving bricks or blocks; and that the alley and street approaches to said street be graded, paved and curbed in conformity to the said street, according to plans and specifications prepared or to be prepared by the Borough Engineer and approved by Council.

That an engineer be employed to fix the grades, prepare plans and specifications, and that a contract to do said work be entered into with the lowest responsible bidder, after due advertisement.

Section 2. That the Borough Engineer in charge of said work, shall make an estimate of the total cost of the improvement, when completed, and shall assess two-thirds of the cost thereof to the real estate owners abutting on said street, by an equal assessment on the feet front bounding or abutting upon said street, and the balance of one-third, to the Borough of Patton.

Section 3. That the municipal assessments for the grading, paving and curbing, or otherwise improving said street shall be filed with the Borough Secretary of the Borough of Patton, who shall give thirty days written or printed notice to the parties assessed, either by service on owner or agent, or left upon the assessed premises, that the assessments are due and payable. If said assessments, or any of them, shall remain unpaid at the expiration of said notice, the same shall be placed in the hands of the Borough Solicitor, whose duty it shall be to collect the same, together with five per cent. additional as attorneys' commissions, and interest from the completion of the grading, paving, curbing or otherwise improving of said street, by municipal lien filed against the delinquent owner, describing the premises, against which *Setra Facias* may issue.

Section 4. The Borough Engineer is hereby directed to advertise for bids for the grading, paving or otherwise improving of said street, according to plans and specifications prepared or to be prepared by him, and to be approved by the Town Council, who will meet and consider the same.

Section 5. That this ordinance be duly advertised as required by law and transcribed in the Ordinance Book of the Borough, and that notice of the passage of the ordinance be published by hand bills, for ten days, as required by law.

Enacted and ordained this 21st day of April, 1922.

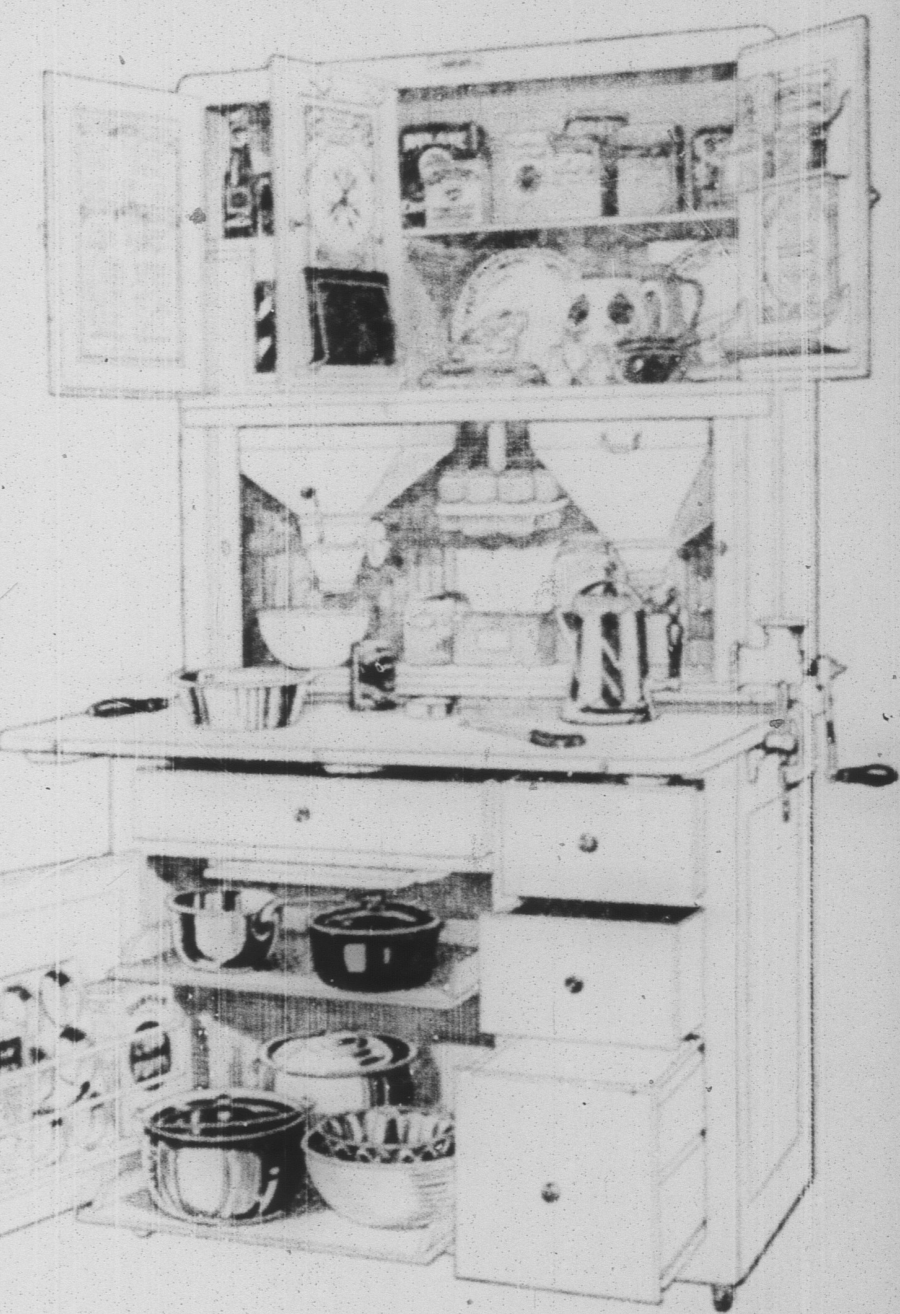

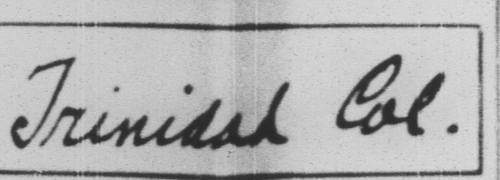
