WARNING TO PARENTS

The officials of the local Volunteer Fire Company, No. 1, have issued a warning to the parents and others of this town, regarding fire drill every Thursday evening between the hours of 6:30 and 7:30. According to the new practice of the fire company, which was instituted last week, the large fire truck, loaded with firemen, dashes through various streets of the town, and fireman jumpers go on through just as though there were a fire. This is done in order to acquaint the firemen with the duties which they must perform at a fire, and undoubtedly will make for greater efficiency. However, there is a tendency of the children of this town to play on the streets, and parents are warned to see that the little ones are kept off the main avenues at the time that the firemen are going through their fire drill. Even grownups are somewhat prone to dash to the street to see the excitement caused by the madly dashing fire truck, and they also are requested to keep to the sidewalks.

In this connection, attention is called to the new motor law passed at Harrisburg recently, requiring auto-ists to pull to the right at the alarm of any fire apparatus, and parking there until such apparatus is passed. Also, in the fire zone autos are not allowed to park within 1000 feet of the fire. This provision in the law would not be hampered in their duties at a fire, and indications are that the new law will be strictly enforced. Citizens of this town are asked to take notice of these regulations, and to be governed accordingly.

Remand Three Franklin Men

EBENSBURG—The regular weekly session of Motion Court was held here Monday. Judges John E. Evans, John H. McCann and Samuel Lemmon Reed were on the bench. A number of motions and petitions were heard by the court.

Grover Wagner, charged with a serious offense against morality, was sentenced to pay the costs and to serve seven years in the county jail, subject to parole.

Hazel and Helen Brown, charged with being inmates of a bawdy house, were sentenced to each pay the costs, a fine of \$10 and to undergo six months imprisonment in the county jail, subject to parole if they promise to return to their home in Maryland.

Auto Wreck At Bradley Junction

Joseph Repko Dies at Spangler Hospital; Jacob Bohrnarek Badly Hurt.

Joseph Repko, aged 24 years, of Jamestown, near Portage, was fatally injured, and Jacob Bohrnarek, aged 26, also of Jamestown, was seriously injured on Sunday night, when an automobile in which they were riding struck a pole and toppled over an embankment. The accident occurred on the road between Bradley Junction and Carrolltown. The injured men were taken to the Miners' Hospital, Spangler, where Repko expired shortly after death being due to a fractured skull. Repko also suffered a fractured jaw, compound fracture of the right forearm and severe bruises about the body. Bohrnarek suffered a slight fracture of the skull, severe lacerations of the scalp and bruises and lacerations about the body.

There were five men in the automobile when the accident occurred. The other three occupants escaped with minor injuries. They were returning from Barnesboro, where they had been visiting friends, and were en route to Cresson. While rounding a sharp curve the auto slipped and crashed into a pole. John Repko, a cousin of the deceased, is claimed to have been driving the car. It is said that he had one eye badly injured and may lose the use of it.

The injured men were picked up by passing autoists and taken to the office of Dr. E. F. Arble, who administered first-aid treatment, after which they were removed to the hospital. Joseph Repko was rendered unconscious and died without regaining consciousness. An operation was performed in an attempt to save his life, but to no avail. The auto was badly damaged in the wreck.

INTERESTING SERVICES
