

**Cambria County Association Favors Organization of Citizens' League.**

EBENSBURG—The 11th annual convention of the Cambria County Supervisors and Good Roads Association, which was held here in the Park Auditorium on Tuesday and Wednesday of last week, was the most successful convention held by the organization.

The afternoon session opened at 1:30 o'clock at which time the reports of the various committees were heard, followed by an open discussion on "Good Roads and More of Them."

A resolution was passed whereby the State Legislature will be asked to pass legislation prohibiting auto trucks from the use of the highways if they are loaded to a capacity exceeding five tons.

A resolution also was passed, asking that the Township Auditor's salary be increased, as the present salary of \$2 per day is insufficient.

It was decided prior to adjournment that the association would hold a picnic during the coming summer, the date to be announced later.

A number of resolutions were adopted at Wednesday morning's session. They are in part as follows: To the President and Members of the Cambria County Supervisors' and Good Roads Association.

We, your committee, appointed to draft and present resolutions, respectfully submit the following, and Walter Jones as representative of your committee, moves their adoption, viz.:

Whereas, by reason of the promise of State rewards for the improvement of township highways and the delay in making payment of the same, and

Whereas, by the undue interference of the State Highway Department with the work of the County Commissioners and Township Supervisors in the permanent reconstruction of township highways, and

Whereas, the overhead expenses of the Pennsylvania State Highway Department have taken a very large percentage of the funds appropriated by the Legislature for road purposes, leaving insufficient money to permanently reconstruct said highways, and

Whereas, this causes long delay and greatly interferes with the permanent reconstruction of the State highway routes, county road systems and township highways; therefore, be it

Resolved, that this association, petition the members of the State Legislature and State Senate to use all their influence and to vote for such legislation as will confine the activities and jurisdiction of the Pennsylvania State Highway Department to the permanent reconstruction of State Highway routes and allow the local county and township authorities to

expand the county and township funds unencumbered by the regulation and the arbitrary rulings of the Pennsylvania State Highway Department.

Be it further resolved, that the chairman appoint a committee consisting of three members of this association, who, with the Secretary as an ex-officio member, shall cause a copy of these resolutions to be given to each member of the next State Legislature and State Senate.

Be it further resolved, that we organize a Cambria County Citizens' Good Roads League, for the purpose of co-operating with the County Commissioners and the Supervisors of the several townships of the County of Cambria in their efforts to carry out their respective parts in the good roads program without being interfered with, delayed, or stopped by the authority, either actual, or assumed, by the officials at Harrisburg.

**MRS. JOHN FLICK PASSES AWAY**

Died at Home of Son in Bradlock. Was Born in Carroll Township.

Mrs. Mary Mildred Nagle Flick, aged 57 years, died at the home of her son, Oscar Flick in Bradlock, of pneumonia at 1:45 o'clock Friday morning. She was the mother of Frederick Flick, a U. S. Marine, who lost his life in the fighting at Chateau-Thierry in 1918.

Mrs. Flick was born at Eckrodt's Mills November 28th, 1864, and was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Michael Nagle. She is survived by her husband, John Flick, a retired blacksmith, and the following children: James F., Alvin, Oscar, Jennings and Edna, at home, and John, of Pittsburgh, and a brother, Harry Nagle, of Altoona. Funeral services were held at 9 o'clock Monday morning in St. Joseph's R. C. Church and burial was made in the Bradlock Catholic Cemetery.

**FORMER BARNESBORO MAN FATALY HURT**

Adam Greach, aged 27 years, until recently a resident of Barnesboro, this county, was fatally injured in a mine accident on Thursday night near Butler, Pa., where he went to work about one week ago. He was employed by the Consolidation Coal & Coke Company at Nicola Mine. Greach was run over by a mine car and his head badly crushed. His death was due to a fractured skull. He expired at 9 o'clock Saturday morning in the Butler County General Hospital.

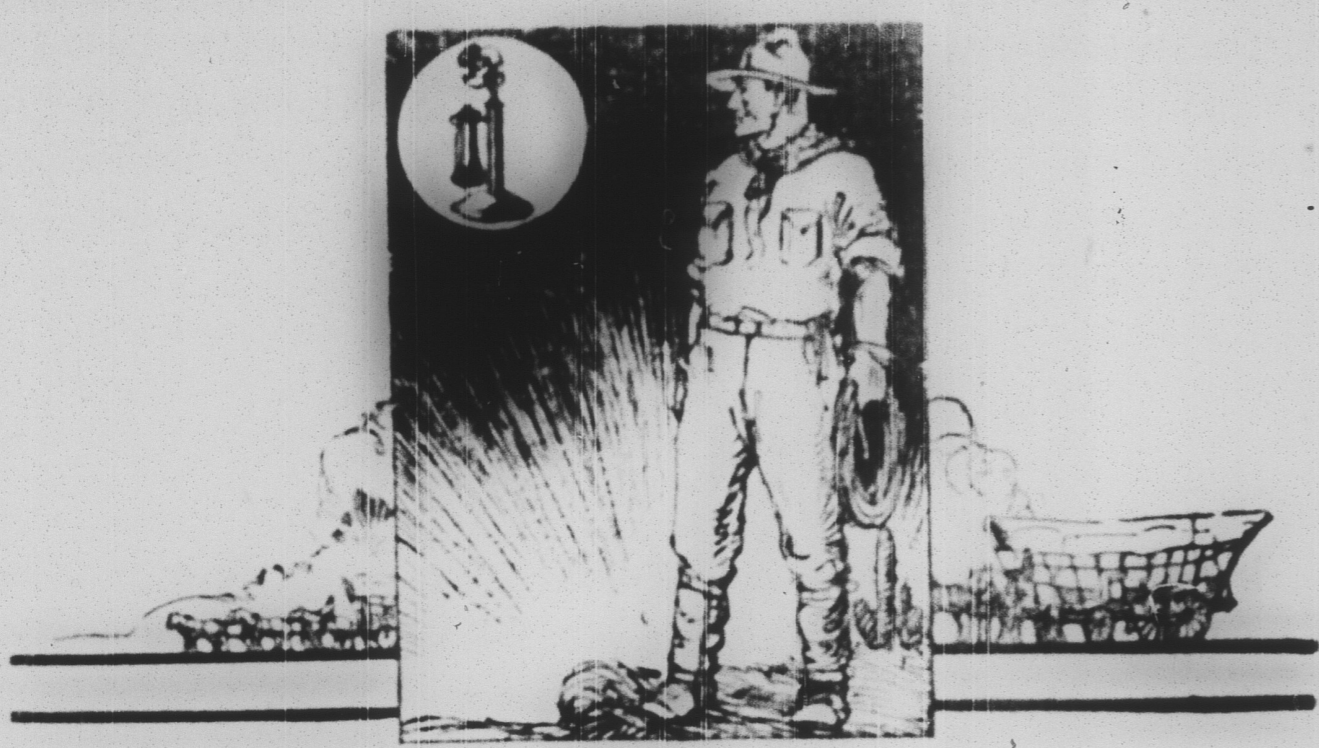
**COURT GRANTS PETITION**
