Says He Killed Man in Barn. "I killed him in self defense," was the confession Monday afternoon of Michael Castellana of Colver, who has been confined in the county jail at Ebensburg since last Thursday, charged with the murder of Paul Sena.

Sena was a Colver visitor at the time he was shot.

The confession was made in District Attorney J. P. Weimer's office, where Castellana was arrested with Nick Longo and kept in the jail until County Detective Ed. Wild and the district attorney made an investigation.

When confronted Monday afternoon and put through the third degree by District Attorney Weimer, Castellana admitted killing Sena, but stated that the crime was committed in self defense.

Castellana admitted paying Sena \$500 for an automobile on March 15, but would not say that he removed the money from Sena's pocket after the murder. Neither would he admit that Longo was connected with the murder. Longo is being held.

Sena's body was found April 2 in a barn on the farm of A. W. Bash on the Carrolltown-Ebensburg road by Fred Smith, a highway workman. The body had been in the barn for more than two weeks. Castellana told the district attorney that the murder was committed in the barn on the Bash farm.

Sena was a Colver visitor at the time he was shot.

Castellana. He received \$500 in payment for the car and returned to work. It is the belief of the authorities that Castellana succeeded in inducing Sena's wife to Ebensburg. Castellana claims the murder was committed near the old barn. Marks the body had been dragged several feet from the door where the body had been dragged several feet on the outside of the building. County Detective White has been

working on the case every day since the body was found. Castellana was arrested after it was known that he had paid the money over to Sena.

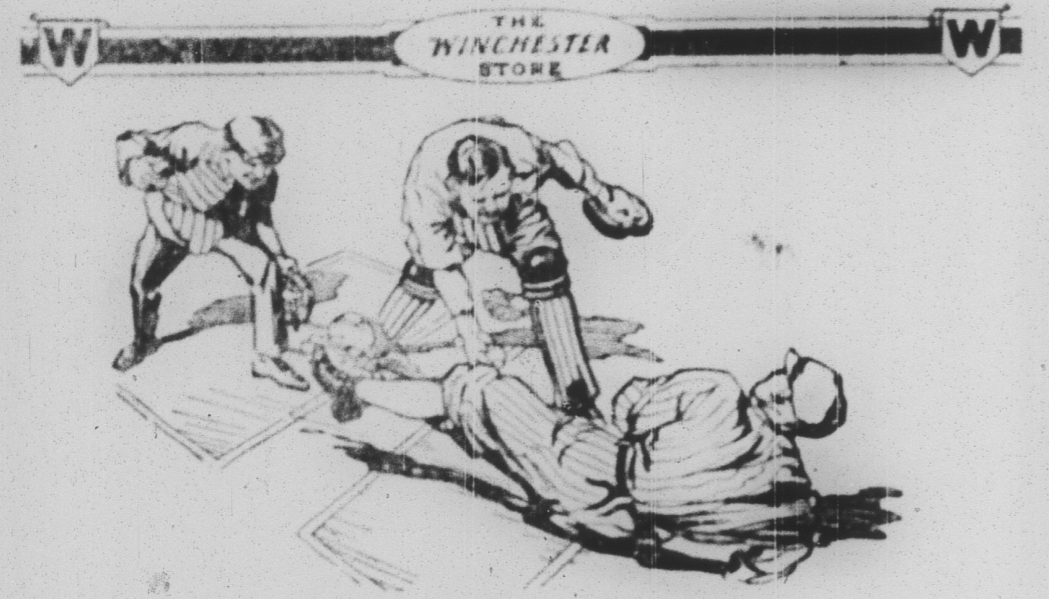

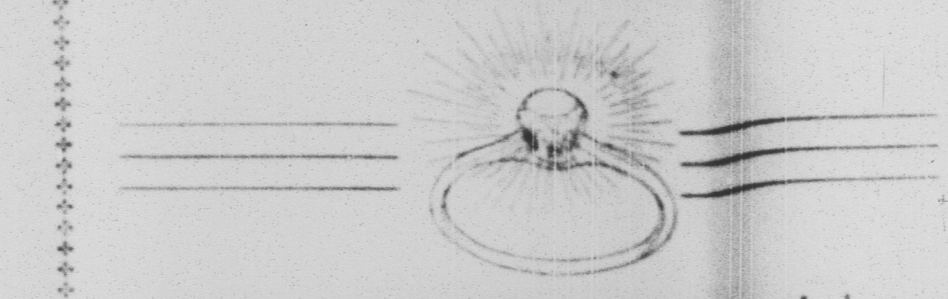
