



His bid being \$29,987. William Diamond, of Johnstown, bid \$31,674.63. The building will be of brick and will contain office rooms for the company, a storeroom and apartments. The contract has not been let.

An automobile containing a party of Conemaugh colored people turned turtle on the Ebensburg-Johnstown road Sunday afternoon, about two miles on the other side of Ebensburg, but none of the occupants were injured. The car left the highway, skidded over a slight embankment and made a complete somersault, landing with the wheels pointing skyward.

Fire Near Ebensburg.

A fire occurred about noon Tuesday on the Leo Kimmel farm, about one mile from Ebensburg, due, it is believed, to spontaneous combustion. The blaze was first noticed in the ice house, which later spread to a small shed that stood between the icehouse and the dwelling house. The Dauntless Fire Company of Ebensburg, extinguished the blaze in short order and the loss was small.

Held for Manslaughter in Connection with Auto Accident Near Here.

PORTEGE—A coroner's jury which met Tuesday and inquired into the death of Joseph Repko, who was fatally injured in an automobile accident at Bradley Junction Easter Sunday and who died the following day in the Spangler Hospital, returned a verdict that the victim came to his death as the result of the fast, reckless and careless driving of John Repko and directed that the driver be held on a charge of manslaughter. John Repko, who is so relative of the victim of the accident, was arrested immediately following the inquest and a short time later was taken before Square J. J. Green, of this place, and released on \$1,000 bail for his appearance at the next term of court.

The jury also inquired into the death of John Dobroski, of Somers, who was run over and instantly killed by a motor truck last Saturday.

Testimony developed that the victim attempted to steal a ride on a food truck driven by Herbert Robbins, meeting death when he attempted to jump on the running board, missing his step and falling beneath the rear wheel. The jury returned a verdict that death was the result of personal neglect on the part of Dobroski and exonerated Robbins from any blame for the accident.

CHEST SURINGS—Alphonse J. Adams, aged 57 years, died Saturday morning about 8 o'clock at the home of his brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Barnett, who reside on a farm near this place following an attack of apoplexy. He had been a locomotive engineer in the Pennsylvania railroad for the last 27 years and was injured about four years ago in a wreck near Bolivar, since which time he had been unable to follow that vocation. He had the distinction of hauling the funeral train which carried the body of President McKinley from Aliquippa to Pittsburgh.

He was a son of Joseph and Barnes Adams and was born January 24, 1865, in Allegheny Township. He never married and besides Mrs. Barnett he is survived by one brother, Charles Adams, of Williamsport, and a sister, Mrs. John Farbaugh, of East Carroll Township.

The funeral took place Tuesday morning at 9:30 o'clock, when a solemn high mass was said in St. Monica's Church, at this place. Burial was made in the church cemetery.

STATE CASH BOX GROWING. HARRISBURG—A post office was closed at the State Treasury Saturday with aggregate balances of \$21,857,279.47, of which only \$14,935.09, however, was in the general fund applicable for payment of general appropriations and bills. The road bond fund had \$12,101,246.24; motor vehicle license fund, applicable only to highways, \$6,445,307.65; insurance tax fund, \$751,518.07; gasoline tax fund, \$347,860.03; and sinking funds, \$608,320.26. Various amounts are held in the uninvested portions of other specific funds.

The aggregate balance is slightly larger than at the end of March. In April the receipts were \$6,024,608.87, and the disbursements \$4,275,515.69.

SEEK AID OF COURT. EBENSBURG—Mary C. McCloskey and Walter T. McCloskey Monday filed a petition for the recovery of a went of horses' colts, demanding the custody of Edgar and Cora Louise McCloskey, 12 and 15 years of age, respectively, children of Walter T. and Stella McCloskey.

The petition recites that the mother of the children died about nine years ago, after which they made their home with the petitioners until five years ago. Meanwhile the father had remarried and asked that the children visit at his home for two weeks. He refused to allow the children to return to the petitioners at the expiration of the visit and still refuses, it is alleged. The petitioners allege that both the father and the steppetmother of the children are un-

fit persons to have charge of them and request that they be returned to them.

The writ was granted by the court returnable at 2 p.m. May 4 at the judges' chambers in Johnstown.
