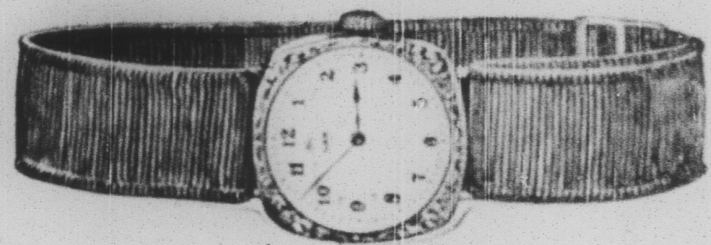

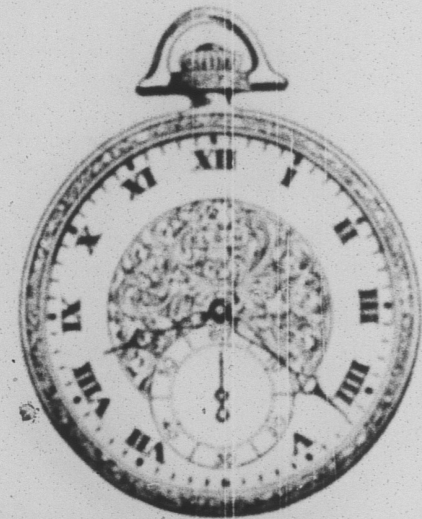

Johnstown Man Is Low Bidder.
W. W. Campbell, of Johnstown, was found to be the lowest bidder when proposals were opened at Spangler Monday for the construction of a two-story building for the Duncan-Spangler Coal Co. at that place, his bid being \$29,987. William Diamond, of Johnstown, bid \$31,674.63. The building will be of brick and will contain office rooms for the company, a storeroom and apartments. The contract has not been let.

Auto Turns Turtle; None Hurt.
An automobile containing a party of Conemaugh colored people turned turtle on the Ebensburg-Johnstown road Sunday afternoon, about two miles on the other side of Ebensburg, but none of the occupants were injured. The car left the highway, skidded over a slight embankment and made a complete somersault, landing with the wheels pointing skyward.

Adoption Is Permitted.
EBENSBURG—James M. Spangler and Antonio C. Shumaker, 513 Locust street, Johnstown, have filed a petition requesting adoption of Donald Harold Shumaker, five months old, son of Warren L. Shumaker and Julia Shumaker of San Antonio, Tex. The parents of the child are unable to properly care for him and have consented to the adoption. The court granted the petition.

Fire Near Ebensburg.
A fire occurred about noon Tuesday on the Leo Kimball farm, about one mile from Ebensburg, due, it is believed, to spontaneous combustion. The blaze was first noticed in the kitchen, which later spread to a small shed that stood between the kitchen and the dwelling house. The Dauntless Fire Company, of Ebensburg, extinguished the blaze in short order and the loss was small.

To Determine Line Between Twp.

EBENSBURG—Philip Caulfield, L. R. Owen and Dixon Tomb have been appointed by the court to act as a board of viewers in locating the dividing line between Summerhill and Adams Township. The court had been petitioned to determine the ques-

tion of the dividing line in order that the costs of the new road between Summerdale and Summerhill may be properly apportioned. The line has been delineated for some time.

Held for Manslaughter in Connection with Auto Accident Near Here.

PORTAGE—A coroner's jury which met Tuesday and inquired into the death of Joseph Repko, who was fatally injured in an automobile accident at Bradley Junction Easter Sunday and who died the following day in the Spangler Hospital, returned a verdict that the result of the fast, reckless and careless driving of John Repko and directed that the driver be held on a charge of manslaughter. John Repko, who is a relative of the victim of the accident, was arrested immediately following the inquest and a short time later was taken before Judge J. J. Green, of this place, and released on \$1000 bail for his appearance at the next term of court.

The jury also inquired into the death of John Dombroski, of Sunman, who was run over and instantly killed by a motor truck last Saturday. Testimony developed that the victim attempted to "steal a ride" on a food truck driven by Herbert Robinson, meeting death when he attempted to jump on the running board, missing his step and falling beneath the rear wheel. The jury returned a verdict that death was the result of personal neglect on the part of Dombroski and exonerated Robinson from any blame for the accident.

Mrs. Mary Meisel Died.

EBENSBURG—Mrs. Mary (Hopper) Meisel, aged 71 years, widow of Thomas Meisel, died at 1:15 o'clock Monday morning at her home here in the East Ward, death being due to apoplexy. She had been ailing for some time, but her condition did not become serious until two days ago.

Mrs. Meisel was daughter of Sigmund and Frances (Hertzog) Hopper and was born in Carroll Township, this county, on May 1, 1848. She is survived by the following children: Catherine, Stella, Grace and Charles Meisel, all at home; Grace, wife of William Murray; Frances, widow of Charles Sawyer, and Philip Meisel, all of this place; Ada, wife of Francis Hertzog, of Carlisle. One son, Albert, died a number of years ago. One brother, Joseph Hopper, of Portage, and one sister, Mrs. Catherine Harry, of this place, also survive. Nineteen grandchildren also survive. Mrs. Meisel was a life-long member of Holy Name Catholic Church, this place.

Funeral services were held at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning in Holy Name Catholic Church and a solemn high mass of requiem was celebrated by the Rev. Father H. M. O'Neil, pastor, after which the remains were

taken to Carlisle, where interment was made in St. Benedict's Catholic Church cemetery.

CHEST SURVINGS—Alphonso J. Adams, aged 31 years, died Saturday morning about 5 o'clock at the home of his brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Barnett, who reside on a farm near this place, following an attack of apoplexy. He had been a locomotive engineer on the Pennsylvania railroad for the last 17 years and was injured about four years ago in a wreck near Bolivar, since which time he has been unable to follow that vocation. He had the distinction of hauling the funeral train which carried the body of President McKinley from Altoona to Pittsburgh.

He was a son of Joseph and Barbara Adams and was born January 24, 1866, in Allegheny Township. He never married and besides Mrs. Barnett he is survived by one brother, Charles Adams, of Williamsport, and a sister, Mrs. John Farnsworth, of East Carroll Township.

The funeral took place Tuesday morning at 9:30 o'clock, when a solemn high mass was said in St. Monica's Church, at this place. Burial was made in the church cemetery.

State Cash Box Growing.
HARRISBURG—April business was closed at the State Treasury Saturday with aggregate balances of \$21,877,279.43, of which only \$13,933.09, however, was in the general fund applicable for payment of general appropriations and bills. The road bond fund held \$12,101,246.24; motor vehicle license fund, applicable only to highways, \$9,645,107.63; insurance tax fund, \$751,518.97; various funds, \$347,860.83; and sinking funds, \$668,120.26. Various amounts are held in the unassigned portions of other specific funds.

The aggregate balance is slightly larger than at the end of March. In April the receipts were \$5,024,638.87, and the disbursements \$4,275,518.99.

Returns in Southern Home.
Miss E. C. Stanford, assistant head nurse of the Cresson Sanatorium for the last year, has severed her connections with that institution and has gone to her home in Jackson's Gap, Ala. Miss Stanford went to Cresson in May of last year from St. Luke's Sanatorium in Arizona, where she had been in charge for several years. She made a host of friends during her stay at the Cresson institution.

Seek Aid of Court.

EBENSBURG—Mary C. McCloskey and Walter T. McCloskey Monday filed a petition for the issuance of a writ of habeas corpus, demanding the custody of Edgar and Cora Lathie McCloskey, 12 and 15 years of age, respectively, children of Walter L. and Stella McCloskey.

The petition recites that the mother of the children died about nine years ago, after which they made their home with the petitioners until five years ago. Meanwhile the father had remarried and asked that the children visit at his home for two weeks. He refused to allow the children to return to the petitioners at the expiration of the visit and still refuses, it is alleged. The petitioners allege that both the father and the step-mother of the children are un-

fit persons to have charge of them and request that they be returned to them.

The writ was granted by the court returnable at 2 p. m. May 4 at the judges' chambers in Johnstown.
