CHOCHEY CHILD INJURED

Andrew Chochey, aged about 8 years, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Chochey, near here, was run over by a Buick from Altoona on last week's street by Thomas Spohny, of this place. Dr. P. J. 215 Pupils Perfect in Attendance. BEAVERDALE—There were 215 pupils perfect in attendance in the local public schools, according to a report submitted by Superintendent Charles S. Kidoa. This was not the case in Onalaska or in country schools. At the end of March there were 1,092 pupils in the 25 schools in Beaverdale. Therefore there were 28 per cent. of the pupils perfect in attendance for the term.

Unknown to Have Auto Race. UNIONTOWN—Pittsburgh capitalists and automobile men will finance the seventh annual universal trophy race at the Uniontown Speedway, Saturday, June 17, according to official announcement made last week. The race will be a championship point event and under the sanction and direction of the American Automobile Association. Entry blanks already are in the hands of the drivers and it is expected that practically all of the entries at Indianapolis will come direct to Uniontown for the big event in June. The race will be 200 miles of the Uniontown track, or 100 miles.
