Pleads Guilty to Stealing Auto;

EBENSBURG—The regular weekly session of Motion Court convened here Monday morning, with Judges John E. Evans, John H. McCann and Samuel Lemmon. Book on the bench. A number of motions and petitions were heard.

The following waived the finding of bills by the Grand Jury, entered pleas of guilty and were sentenced by the Court: James Custer, larceny, was directed to pay the costs of prosecution and to serve three years in the county jail, subject to parole. He was charged with stealing an automobile in Johnstown on April 28 last.

Joseph Twardosky, breaking and entering, was sentenced to pay the costs and to serve two years in the county jail. He broke into the store of Harry Reese, at Cassandra, and stole merchandise to the value of \$30. The defendant also broke into the American Express Company office at Portage. He also stole \$15 from the store of John Gretzick, of Portage Township.

John Huston and James Cole, breaking and entering, were sentenced to each pay the costs and to serve one year in the county jail. They broke into the service station of Davis & Company at Johnstown.

J. W. Burns, an offense against morality, was directed to pay the costs and a fine of \$100. Robert Morton, who entered a plea of guilty to forgery in court here last week, was sentenced to pay the costs, a fine of \$100 and to undergo not less than three nor more than three years and six months in the Western Penitentiary. He forged two checks, each in the sum of \$20, using the name of R. F. Rutledge, of Johnstown.

Funeral of Mrs. D. R. Lewis. EBENSBURG—Mrs. D. R. Lewis of this place, died suddenly at noon, Wednesday of last week, death being due to heart failure. She had been in her usual health up to within a very short time of her death. Mrs. Lewis was 77 years of age and had been a resident of Ebensburg about three years. She is survived by two sons, E. E. Lewis, treasurer of the Savings & Trust Co., of Indiana, Pa., and I. E. Lewis, treasurer of the Cambria Title, Savings & Trust Co., of this place, with whom she made her home.

The deceased was a member of the Presbyterian Church, of Indiana. Funeral services were held at Indiana Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

Affair Held in Fort Stanwix Hotel, Johnstown. Almost 50 hardware dealers of Johnstown and other territory included in the domain of the Pennsylvania and Atlantic Seaboard Hardware Dealers' Association held a most successful convention in the Fort Stanwix Hotel, Johnstown on Thursday, and went away with better ideas of the hardware trade and with a spirit of good fellowship. The convention session was featured by a number of good addresses on important subjects to the hardware men, and a question box was conducted.

The question box proved to be one of the big events of the evening. Numerous questions regarding the trade that had been sent in by members of the association were taken up and discussed with the idea of reaching a conclusion, and good results were obtained.

Among speakers of the program was G. H. Pierce, of Pittsburgh, an expert accountant and advertising manager. Vice President Huey McKnight was the next speaker and he was followed by Sharon E. Jones, of Pittsburgh, Secretary of the association.

Many Delegations Going. Many groups of citizens from various sections of the county visited the County Commissioners Monday, each delegation bent on securing approval of projects for road improvement.

Delegations included those from Bakerton and West Carroll Township, asking a road from Bakerton to Spangler; from Lower Yoder Township, for the paving of Wall street as a link between present paving and Brownstown Borough, and from Cambria Township, for the paving of a road from the P. J. Little farm toward Wilmore, a distance of four and one-half miles. The Lower Yoder Township was ordered, the contract being signed. The others are in various stages of acceptance.

Many complaints were received on unnecessary delays, due to State Highway Department rules on approval of plans and specifications at Harrisburg. People from various districts were sharp in their criticism.

Discussing this matter, County Commissioner T. Stanton Davis said: "We may be forced, finally, to sever connections with the State Highway Department and decide to build all our roads without State aid, using only county and township funds. This is being done in Fayette, Washington and Westmoreland Counties and reports from those districts indicate results are far more satisfactory. Our people are constantly complaining of delays, and if there is no change, we may be compelled to make one. Road builders also criticize conditions and say they are blamed for things for which they are not responsible. Looks as if something would have to be done."

In this connection, James F. Boyer, President of the Cambria County Citizens' Good Roads League, announced that a meeting would be held under the auspices of the league, in the Ebensburg Auditorium, tomorrow afternoon, beginning at 2 o'clock. "We may have to hold an evening session," said Mr. Boyer, "and it may be that we will give Johnstown a meeting also. We want all candidates to attend and urge all Supervisors who possibly can do so to be present. A prominent speaker is being sought, and as soon as we know whether he can come, we will announce the fact."

New Cambria County Association Adopts Constitution and By-Laws. CRENSON—The Volunteer Firemen's Association of Cambria County and vicinity, met in the parlors of the Crenson Fire Department, in the Municipal building, Thursday evening, with representatives present from the following towns: Crenson, Lilly, Patton, Hastings, Coneygaugh, Spangler, Nanty-Glo, South Fork, Seal Level, Paint Borough and Portage.

After the reading of the minutes of the last meeting, the chairman of the Crenson delegates, Robert Wizegan, read the proposed constitution and by-laws, which embodied the following important points: The name of the Association shall be the Volunteer Firemen's Association of Cambria and vicinity, in order that certain towns, located partly in this and an adjoining county, may become members. The aims of the Association shall be to promote the organization of fire fighting companies in towns which at present have no such organizations, to secure legislation to cover the care of men injured while fighting fires as volunteers, to secure a standard of fire fighting equipment in all towns in the association, and to devise methods to better combat the ravages of fire, and to instill a fraternal feeling among the various companies comprising the association.

The reading of the by-laws was followed by the election of the following officers, who will serve until the regular meeting to be held during the month of August: President, William E. Richards, of Lilly; Vice President, William Trumble, of Patton; Secretary, John P. McGowan, of Crenson; Treasurer, A. F. Baker, of Hastings.

The election of officers was followed by the second reading of the by-laws and action on each section as read. It was the business of the convention that, for the next regular convention, to be held in August, each member company would be entitled to three delegates and the officers elected, the officers to have no vote on any questions coming before the convention, during the present term.

After a discussion on the advisability of holding a one or three day session in August, the matter was held in abeyance until the next meeting, which will be held in Crenson Friday, June 1.
