splendidly. Pastor Zwayer's sermon last Sunday evening at the Chapel was on the Parable of the Pounds, at the Patton church on it All Depends on You. During the twelve years the church building and the Chapel were erected and paid for. An old debt of nearly two thousand was paid off. All running expenses paid. Contri-butions to missions have increased each year, one hundred and seventyeight persons were reived by baptism, twenty-four of these at the Chapel Of those Baptized 69 have left town. and nine have died. Twenty-fuor other members were received on experience and by letter. Of these twelve have left town and three have died. Some of the original members have also moved away, and others hav died. Of those who have gone from town, nearly all are faithful workers in other churches and hence have not been lost to the cause of Christ. The secret of the success of the past is that so many have realized that "It all depends on each one."
With members and pastor thus feeling the responsibility of the work as a personal responsibility, each doing all he or she can, and working with the others who do all they can, still great-er things are in store for the future.
