**"License Entitles Holder to Drive
 Any Motor Car."**
 The automobile division of the State
 Highway Department has acquiesced
 to the wishes of the Motor Club of
 Harrisburg in refusing to tolerate the
 payment of a fee of \$1.00 to every
 "owner-driver" who desires to operate
 a motor vehicle other than his own,
 as it seen from the conclusion of Reg-
 istry Eynor that an "owner-driver's"
 license entitles the holder to legally
 operate (except the paid driver or
 chauffeur, who directly or indirectly
 receives pay or any compensation as
 such for any work or services he or
 she may do for a registered owner)
 any motor vehicle whether registered
 in the holder's name or otherwise.
 "The decision that any owner who
 desires to operate any other vehicle
 but his own would be compelled to pay
 an extra registration fee of \$1.00 was
 handed down about a month ago by
 Deputy Attorney General Brown, and
 while the Motor Club of Harrisburg
 requested a decision of the Attor-
 ney General, immediate steps were
 taken to have the decision reversed
 by the State Highway Department.
 The success of the Motor Club in ob-
 taining this ruling means a saving
 to motorists of from \$500,000 to \$800,-
 000 annually.—Harrisburg Patriot.

Students To Hold Show.
 During the first week after the
 holiday recess, students in the de-
 partment of agronomy at the Penn-
 sylvania State College will stage a
 show of corn and small grains, the
 exhibits for which will come from
 their home farms. Each student
 while he is at home, will select his
 exhibits from the crops which he helped
 to produce during the 1922 season.
 In the corn classes, the entries consist
 of ten ears each, as is the custom in
 state and county shows, and each stu-
 dent is permitted to enter in any one
 or all the classes. To facilitate the
 classification, the state has been di-
 vided into five districts, and the win-
 ners in the several districts are then
 to be judged in a state class. The
 small grains will be shown in half-
 peck lots in a state-wide competition.
 The coming show has aroused a great
 deal of interest among the students
 and faculty of the department, and
 most of the former are planning to
 return with one or more exhibits of
 their home-grown crops.
New Rhubarb Bulletin.
 Commercial and practical grow-
 ers of rhubarb will find Bulletin No.
 174, of the Pennsylvania State Experi-
 ment Station, at State College, a pam-
 phlet full of valuable information on
 the cause of excessive losses in the
 rhubarb field, and the control meas-
 ures suggested. It has been prepared
 by W. S. Beach, of the Bustleton
 Field Station, after years of study and

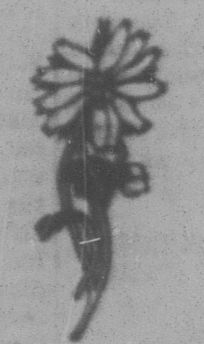
