TELEPHONE OPERATORS CAREFULLY TRAINED

Given Practical Course of Training Before Being Assigned to Switchboard Positions.

The pleasant inflection in the telephone operator's voice as she asks "Number, please," is not always the gift of nature. In the Operator's Training Department of the Bell Telephone Company of Pennsylvania, at Philadelphia. Pa, as well as in the training of operators at other points through out Pennsylvania, particular stress is laid on voice inflection and distinct articulation during the course of instruction that is given to applicants accepted for operators' positions. The average telephone user does not realize the difficulty encountered In distinct articulation, particularly as

applied to telephone operating.

The word "nine" often sounds like "five" when spoken over the telephone. Because of this, operators taking the course of instruction at the Philadelphia school are given special training in the pronunciation of numerals. They are taught to pronounce "nine" in two syllables, as "ni-en." "Four" is also taught in two syllables as

In this way many errors are elimibated, for when the operator repeats a number, the decided emphasis laid on the numerals is often the means of calling attention to misleading pronumeration

Of course, the instruction in switch board operating is one of the most important phases of the scudents' training. Accuracy and speed are two important requirements of telephone operating and only by constant practice can these faculties be acquired or developed. That is why one section of the operators' school in Philadelphia is just like a full-fledged central office. The students sit at a large switch-board and practice establishing telephone connections.

After leaving the training department students receive the grade of Junior operators and are assigned to the less exacting switchboard positions until by actual experience they are capable of handling more difficult positions.
