Regular Weekly Session of Motion Court Monday; New Auditor for Franklin

The regular weekly session of Motion Court was held at Ebensburg, Monday with Judges John E. Evans, and John H. McCann on the bench. The following waived the finding of bills by the grand jury, entered a plea of guilty and were sentenced:

### Bakerton Concern Contracts

According to an announcement made Friday by officials of the Sterling Coal Company, of Bakerton, improvements that will cost in the neighborhood of \$250,000, will be started at once. Contracts have already been let for the major part of the improvement work. Other improvements are being planned and will be started within the near future. Among the improvements will be the construction of an all-steel tipple, rock dump, picking table and screen, which will cost \$125,000. This contract has been let to the Roberts-Schaffer Company, of Chicago. The company also has contracted with the Jeffery Manufacturing Company of Columbus, O., for the installation of a new fan. Plans are being completed for the building of a new machine shop, motor barn and blacksmith shop, these improvements to cost about \$100,000. The improvement plan will entail additional expenditures for the extension of railroad sidings, etc., to take care of the increased output of the company. The output of the company has been increased by the purchase of 728 acres of valuable coal land.
