Improve Quality and Yield

County Farm Agent H. C. McWil-
liams, of Ebensburg, has announced
that for the benefit of the potato
growers of Cambria county who are
interested in improving the quality
and yield of their crop, a car of Mich-
igan seed potatoes has been purchas-
ed and will be distributed by George
H. Cupp and Co., of Johnstown. The
Cambria County potato growers for
the past three years have been work-
ing to improve their yield of potat-
oes through the use of better seed,
spraying, etc. It is very necessary
from time to time to import seed from
outside sources so that a check may
be kept on the progress that is being
made by the Cambria County grow-
ers.

This car of seed will be available
for the farmers of this county as far
as the amount that is being shipped
at this time will reach.

Victim of Venturesome Spirit
DUNLO—Victim of a venturesome
spirit, Victor Rosman, 11-year-old
schoolboy, was drowned in the Ed-
gar municipal swimming pool at noon
Wednesday. The body was recovered
three hours later, only after 18 sticks
of dynamite had been used to blow
up the concrete breast of the dam
comprising the pool, the water being
drained out.

With four or five companions, Vic-
tor Rosman was on his way home
from the Dunlo grade school. Ap-
proaching the swimming pool, the
lads playing at "bantler lead," found
the water still covered by ice, and it
was proposed that they test its
strength. Victor Rosman was the
leader and ventured out some 10 or
12 feet before the ice, melting under
the rays of the spring sun, gave way.
None of the others was near him, but
one lad, whose name could not be
learned made an attempt to save his
companion and was almost drowned
himself. He finally reached land after
he several times had given way un-
der his weight.

The Rosman boy, after a brief
struggle, was submerged in eight feet
of water. The other school boys quick-
ly gave an alarm, but it was found
impossible for adults to venture out
those soon on the scene were Dr. Liv-
ingstone and Constable George Fox.
On their advice destruction of the
breast of the dam by dynamite was
decided upon as the only way to re-
cover the body and because of the
strong construction 18 sticks of the
explosive were required.

The Llanfair swimming pool, con-

and about 300 feet long, the depth

Cresson Men Escape Injury
CRESSON—While engaged with
other workmen in removing an old
bridge on the La Jose Branch of the
Pennsylvania Railroad, near La Jose,
J. E. Houzel and W. D. Litzinger,
both of Cresson, carpenters employed
under Master Carpenter George Blair
of Cresson, on Monday narrowly es-
caped serious injury and probably
death when both men in some manner
slipped at the same time. Litzinger
was thrown clear of the bridge into
the Susquehanna River. Grasping
some bridge irons which were laying
in about six feet of water, he managed
to hold on until his rescue was ef-
fected by other workmen.

Houzel, in falling, in some manner
caught his feet on a large plank lay-
ing at the edge of the bridgework.
Hanging upside down above the river
which was running at a 12-foot stage
under the bridge, Houzel's body was
suspended in the air for several min-
utes. Fellow-workmen after resus-
citating Litzinger saved Houzel from fall-
ing. Houzel displayed remarkable
presence of mind, in being able to
hold his body perfectly still until
his rescue was effected.

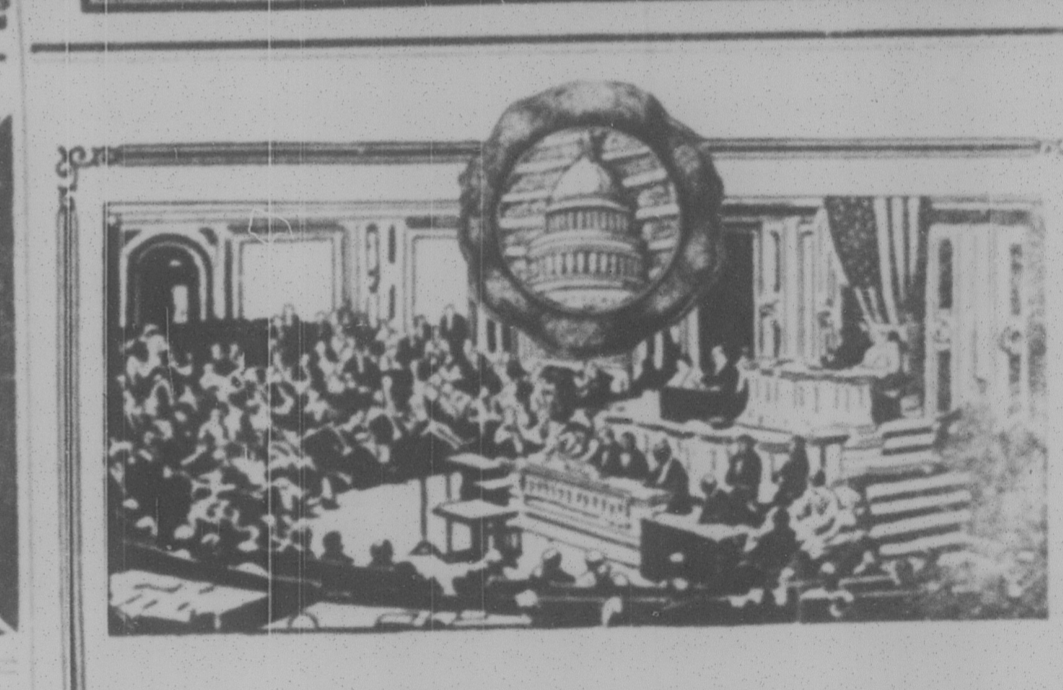
