Portage Men in Wreck.—Four Portage young men, Leo Weaver, Martin Crumb, William Mason and Elmer Walker, narrowly escaped serious injury about 7 o'clock Sunday when a Ford touring car in which

they were riding overturned along the Williams-Portage highway. One of the wheels of the machine came off causing the accident. The young men were shaken up and suffered bruises. Their injuries were dressed by Dr. J. F. Bozzant of Portage. The auto was badly damaged.

Legion Obtains Ruling Favorable to Disabled.—WASHINGTON—Disabled men, who because of financial considerations, have been unable to accept vocational training under sections 2 and 3 of the original Servicemen's Readjustment Act, have been able to take up their rights to training, if their disability increases so as to place them under a Section 2 rating, which allows base pay with training.

This broad interpretation of the law has been announced by the Legal Division of the Veterans Bureau, after representations of the officials of the previous ruling had been made by Joe Sparks, chairman of the national rehabilitation committee of the American Legion.

Mr. Sparks pointed out that many men who had been awarded vocational training under the provisions of Section 2 had been unable to take up the work on account of financial conditions. The previous interpretation provided that a veteran forfeited his right to training in the event he did not accept it within a year after the award, barring many human applicants from a vocational education. In addition, many veterans whose rights have already expired will be made eligible under Section 2 of the law, by the recent decision of their disability has increased.

Section 2 of the law provides a base pay of \$50 per month, with allowances for dependents, the payment of which does not effect payment of any compensation the veteran may be receiving, in addition to training.

The decision was handed down by William Wolfe Smith, General Counsel of the Legal Division of the Veterans Bureau.

Legion Restores Neglected Graves in Arlington Cemetery.—WASHINGTON—Because of the neglected condition of the graves of World War veterans buried in the Arlington national cemetery, last week the members of the American Legion from the District of Columbia put on their olive drab uniforms and wrapped leggings, and with barrowed lawnmowers, shovels, shears and rakes, marched to the cemetery in making it presentable for Memorial Day exercises.

The rank growth of grass which covered headstones of the national cemetery was not due to neglect on the part of the War Department, but resulted from insufficient appropriation having been made by Congress to conduct the work in Arlington, probably the most widely known cemetery and contains the graves of thousands of the country's most celebrated heroes.

Unearth Skull in Ditch.—WILKES-BARRE—The discovery of a skull in a ditch where employees of the Delaware & Hudson Coal Company were clearing out a hole in the ground, was another perplexing problem to solve. No other bones were found. There was still some of the tissues left on the bones, leading to the belief that the skull was that of the victim of any considerable length of time.

Youngster Lost 26 Hours.—HAZELTON—After wandering in great woods nearly 36 hours, Michael Dill, 3-year-old son of Mrs. Anna Dill, a widow of Stockton, a mining village near here, was in good shape Saturday, following his discovery by Lehigh Valley Roadmen at Ashland three miles away.

Eleven Survive.—ROARING SPRING—Lieutenant H. N. Lower Post No. 52, of the A. O. U. of Roaring Spring, organized in 1883 and which soon had 130 members, has now only 11 members. The post was named in honor of Lieutenant Lower, who lost his life in the battle of Cold Harbor. Many of the veterans of the post served under him and several witnessed his death. Only three members of the 17 charter members are living. They are D. B. Carpenter and William M. Snyder, of Roaring Spring, and Benjamin Showmaker, of Taylor township. The other eight are composing the membership of the post are Charles W. Zook, Thomas R. Bookhamer, Jacob Rightmeyer, John R. Garber, William Shaffer, William Lyles, Baxter Hamilton and William Heuston.

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
