

**Gentry Bros. Famous Shows.**

Elizabeth, 11-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Elliott of Beaverdale is confined to the parental home, suffering from burns about the body, as a result of an accident which occurred at the Denmark home Monday morning. The two girls were endeavoring to lift a large kettle of boiling water from the stove at the Denmark home, when the boiler upset and the water was dashed upon the two girls.

**Nant-y-Glo Miner Injured.**  
Joseph Harris of Nant-y-Glo, aged 42, an employee of the Hely road crew, was admitted to the Memorial hospital Johnstonown at 4:30 o'clock Monday afternoon suffering of injuries to the chest sustained from a fall of rock while at work.

**Theatre Case is Non-Suited.**  
A non-suit was granted by Judge John E. Evans about 10 o'clock Friday afternoon in the case of Laura N. Gorman and A. I. Edolston, an action to trespass. The Court sustained a motion made by counsel for the defendant on the grounds of lack of sufficient evidence produced on the part of the plaintiff.

**Boy Drowns Swimming.**  
JEANETTE, swimming and thought to have been scolded with tragedy, John Edolston, 11 years old, only son of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Edolston, Thursday was drowned in the Dutch Creek. The drowning occurred at a place between Greenvale and Radclough, where boys have a small dam for swimming. When the boy sank, a companion ran for help, which arrived too late. The body was recovered two hours later.

**Many Priests Present.**  
Several thousand people witnessed the laying of the cornerstone for the handsome granite edifice being erected in Conemaugh by the members of the Sacred Heart Catholic congregation, of which the Rev. Father James J. Gill is the pastor and the Rev. Father Francis McKenna, assistant. The exercises were held Sunday afternoon and were conducted by the Rt. Rev. John J. McCort, D. D., Bishop of the Allison Diocese, who came here by automobile from Hastings, where he administered the Sacrament of Confirmation Sunday morning. The master of ceremonies was the pastor of the church, the Rev. Father Gill, who is engineering the erection of the handsome church, which, when finished, will be one of the finest Catholic edifices in the western part of Pennsylvania.

The Bishop was assisted in the impressive services by the Rev. Father Hugh F. O'Neill, pastor of the Holy Name Catholic Church, Ebensburg, as deacon, and the Rev. Father Peter Fox pastor of St. Joseph's Catholic Church, Renovo, Pa., sub-deacon. Father O'Neill organized the Conemaugh congregation and was succeeded by the Rev. Father Fox. Father Gill has been in charge of the congregation since Father Fox left here in 1912, for the charge in Clinton county. The chanters at the services were the Rev. Father Richard Fullam, of Our Lady of Mercy Church, Prospect, and the Rev. Father James Fitzgibbon, assistant rector at St. Columba's Church, Sixteenth ward.

Among the priests who attended the ceremonies were the Rev. Fathers: Joseph Howell, South Fork; Michael O'Connor, Nant-y-Glo; James Caven, Crosson; Stephen A. Ward, Westmont; Dr. Philip Egan, Moxam; Richard Fitzgibbon, St. Columba's; James Novak, Woodville; Thomas Houton, Mercy Hospital chaplain; James B. Egan, Allison; Mathias Pfeil, Brownstone; Charles Jay, Ex-pedit; and Francis Pitt, the latter the pastor of the new Polish congregation in Conemaugh. One of the societies connected with the Polish church attended in a body. Following the cornerstone exercises Father Gill gave a dinner to the Bishop and priests of the diocese. Dinner was held for 50.

The cornerstone was laid on June 27, 1923, the name of the President of the United States, Governor of this State, names of the Superior and Supreme Court Judges, Congressmen from this district, present Bishops of Conemaugh, a short history of the State of Pennsylvania, names of the former and present pastors and a copy of a newspaper containing a history of the congregation.

**New Fishing License Law.**  
HARRISBURG, Pa., June 26.—An increase in the fishing license fee for 1923 was estimated at between \$200,000 and \$750,000 for the year in force, as the result of lowering the age limit for the issuance of fish licenses, the Department of Fisheries announced Monday. The number of special licenses issued last month exceed by several thousand the number issued for the same month in 1922.

The department announced that several thousand permits for the use of outlines had been issued, and that requests were being received at the rate of about 100 per day. The season for the use of outlines continues until November 15. The Department also is receiving many requests for the use of spear or gig, although their use is not permitted until July 1.

**Plans of the Railroads for Greater Public Service.**  
"Anticipating the greatest volume of freight traffic in their history this year, the railroads have adopted a concerted policy and intensive working program to enable them to meet the growing transportation needs of the country."  
"In full realization of necessity for the greatest improvement and expansion possible of the country's transportation facilities to meet the growing demands of commerce, the railroads have authorized, since January 1, 1922, for cars, locomotives, trackage and other facilities, the expenditure of \$1,540,000,000, of which \$440,000,000 actually was expended during 1922."  
"The railroads are raising this enormous amount of additional capital largely through borrowed money on the abiding faith in the fairness of the American people, and reliance on continuance of the policy announced in the Transportation Act of 1920, as a measure of reasonable protection to investment in railroad property."  
"From January 1, 1922, to March 15, 1923, the railroads purchased 223,616 new freight cars. Of these, 117,280 have been delivered and put in service. The railroads during that time also purchased 4,219 new locomotives. Of that number 2,100 have already been placed in service."  
"The railroads confidently look forward to the successful movement of the greatest volume of traffic in the history of the country and to the best efforts of that end."
