Billy O'Brine, One of Six Famous "Flies" Will Scale the Palmer House

Billy O'Brine one of the country's six original human flies, will entertain Patton people on Saturday evening at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Emory A. Diehl, of this place. A number of Greenburg people were in attendance, and Mrs. McDougal was present with a purse of money, the gift of her children, a dinner at Sunset Park was a part of the festivities of the day, and the following were present: Mr. and Mrs. Emory A. Two new production records were established by the Ford Motor Company during the week ending Tuesday, June 12. The Ford News announced. The total domestic output for the week was 40,346 Ford Cars and Trucks, 183 more than the last week, that ending May 29 with its total of 39,563.

Daily production went to its new high figure Tuesday when the Ford assembly plants turned out 5,588 Cars and Trucks, beating the record of 6,781 established on May 25. Ford Tractor production for the week was 2,698.

The Lincoln division of the Ford Motor Company produced 174 Cars for the week ending Tuesday. Ford Motor No. 100000 was turned out at the Ford Motor Company on June 8th and shipped on that date to the Los Angeles Branch of the Company.

Claims Damages for Timber. Suit has been brought by Edward Dunphy against the Patton Mining Corporation to recover \$1,000 which is claimed to be due for the timber destroyed by the Patton mine. The suit is based on the property of the defendant company. The state statement of claim alleges that the defendant company had started a fire on its own property adjoining that of the plaintiff in order to clear the purpose of clearing some of its land and that it was permitted to spread and burn over approximately 50 acres of timber on the Dunphy tract.

Former Patton Resident Expires. Henry Meredith, aged about 35 years, a son of Mr. and Mrs. John Meredith, and a former Patton resident, passed away at Morgantown, West Virginia, on Monday, following an illness of but short duration of pleurisy pneumonia. The body was brought over to Patton on Wednesday and funeral services were conducted on Thursday afternoon after burial was made in Fairview cemetery. He was a member of the Loyal Order of Moose of Patton. Mr. Meredith was unmarried, and has been employed in West Virginia for some time.

County Commissioners Will Pay. The County Commissioners have appropriated, from bond funds, upon petition presented by the Road Supervisors of Susquehanna Township, two-thirds of the cost, not to exceed the sum of \$139,089, towards the improvement of a section of the highway leading to Patton, about 16,000 feet in length, beginning at a point on State Highway Route No. 1 and extending to the Patton road.

Lightning Destroys Stable. Lightning struck the stable of Andy Saltgiver, near the Klondike School house, during the electrical storm last Saturday afternoon, and the flames ensuing therefrom burned the building to the ground. A. service in the western front during the war.

Man 103 Years Old, Dead. James Ballentine, 103 years old, of Williamstown, W. Va., across the Ohio river from Marietta, O., died Monday. His death was due to general debility. He was born in Blairsville, Indiana County, Pa. He leaves three children, the oldest 73 and the youngest 54 years old. James Ballentine was born in 1820, but left Blairsville for Ohio many years ago.

Violating Mine Laws Charged. William Clayton was held for court in a hearing before Alderman James W. Reese, Johnstown on Saturday charged with violation of the mine laws. Inspector Nicholas Evans was the prosecutor. It was charged that Clayton, employed in the Valley No. 3 mine in a loaded trip of cars contrary to the mine laws. Bail was furnished for court.

Nant-y-Glo Boy Hurt. NANT-Y-GLO—Joseph Yanoche, aged 11 years, of this place, suffered a fracture of the hip recently when run over by an automobile. The machine was parked along the street and a group of children while playing around it released the brakes and attempting to get out of the car the Yanoche boy fell under the wheels. The machine crashed into a picket fence and was badly damaged.
