**Leprosy Boy Recovers—**  
**AMBRIDGE**—That Tony Caloudi, 15 years old, a former Ambridge boy, has recovered from leprosy and is now on his grandfathers' farm on the Isle of Patmos, is word that has been received here by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Gust Caloudi. About two years ago it was discovered the boy had

leprosy. He was placed under close guard here while arrangements were pending to deport him. International complications were threatened for a time, but the Government was insistent in its demand that the steamship company which brought him to this country a few months previous to his illness take him away. The parents

of the boy are considering steps to have him rejoin them here.  
**New Highway Contract Let—**  
**NEW CASTLE**—Lawrence County commissioners have been notified that the contract for the Harlansburg road, from Harlansburg to the Butler County Line, has been awarded by

the State Highway department. It is expected that work on the project will be started soon. It will give an improved highway to New Castle to Slippery Rock, the latter County end of the project also being under way.

**Oil Will Not Pay a Drilling—**  
**HARRISBURG**—Investigation by the State Geologic Survey into occurrence of oil in the region of Pittsburgh, has resulted that the wells will not pay the cost of drilling, it was announced by the Department of Forest and Waters. "None of the recent tests are large," the statement said, "they are so closely spaced that they will quickly drain the territory," it said.

**Man's Body Identified—**  
**HARRISBURG**—The body of a man who was picked up by two boys in the woods near Monaca, while they were picking cherries, has been identified as that of Andrew J. Johnson, 50 years old of Seneca, who had been missing from home. He is believed to have committed suicide by hanging. Three children survive.

**To Become Missionary—**  
**WASHINGTON**—Glen P. Reed of Houston, graduate of the Princeton Theological Seminary has been appointed a missionary to the Sudan. He will be ordained by the Chartiers Presbytery at its meeting next Tuesday night at the Cross Roads United Presbyterian Church. Mr. Reed, who is a son of Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Reed of Houston, expects to sail next September.

**HARRISBURG**—National Guard appointments were announced by the Adjutant General as follows: Samuel D. Frederick, Altoona, to be captain First Battalion Headquarters De-

tachment Combat Train, 123th Anti-Aircraft, First Sergeant F. A. Hinz, term master, Jr., Scranton, to be lieutenant Headquarters Company, 100th Infantry.

**Three Injured—**  
**BOSWELL**—Three occupants of a large touring car sustained painful bruises and lacerations when their car skidded and overturned on a sharp turn near the Mountain Inn, along the Lincoln Highway. The injured people were brought to the office of Dr. Saus here and were able to resume their journey, following first aid attention.

**Police Sergeant is Killed—**  
**ALTOONA**—Joseph Lintner, aged 31 years, of this city, employed as a police sergeant on the Middle Division of the Pennsylvania Railroad, was fatally injured, about 11:15 a clock Saturday morning when he was crushed under the wheels of a freight car that he died a short time later in the Altoona hospital. Lintner was inspecting a train in the local yards when the train began to move, throwing the sergeant between two cars, the wheels passing over the lower half of the body. The deceased was married.

**Accident Victim Missing—**  
**GREENSBURG**—Searching parties headed by state police and police from this place and Jeannette are searching the woods and open country between Grapeville, near here, and this place for Alexander Hamilton, 35 years old a miner of Adamsburg, who could not be located after his wrecked automobile was found upside down at the side of the Lincoln highway near what is known as the "S" curve, near Grapeville.

**Three Injured in Auto Wreck—**  
**FARRELL**—Mrs. Andrew Cariben and two children were injured and two others escaped with minor bruises when a touring car went into a ditch and turned over east of here last night. The car was operated by Matt Anderson, who said the steering gear went wrong and he lost control.

**Tube Bursts, Swimmer Drowns—**  
**SCRANTON**—William Smith, 17 went bathing in the Susquehanna River near Tankhannock Sunday, using an inflated inner tube as a life preserver. When a good distance from shore the tube burst and Smith, who was unable to swim, sank into the water. Rescuers spent the night working to recover the boy's body.

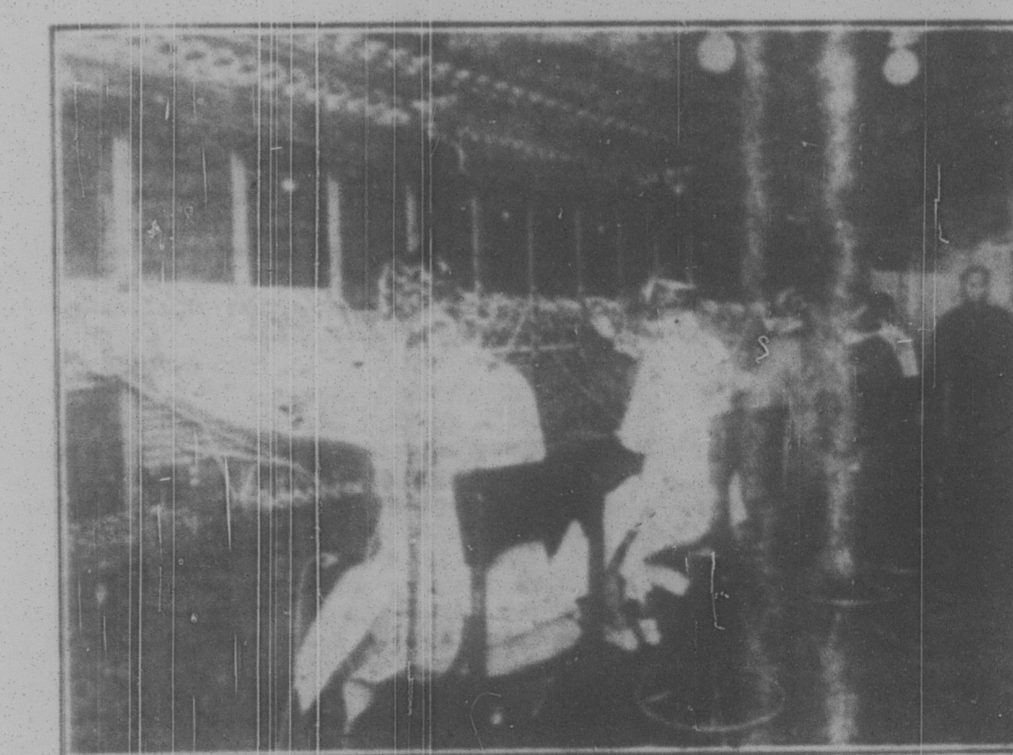

### CHINESE TELEPHONE OPERATORS MUST SPEAK TWO LANGUAGES



Telephone Exchange in Chinatown, San Francisco.

The Chinese telephone exchange in San Francisco is a peculiar combination of the Far East and America. Chinese girls dressed in native costumes, speaking the Chinese language, as well as English, operate a central office equipped with American telephone equipment.

Practically every Chinese merchant in San Francisco has a telephone in his place of business and judging by the increased demand for service the telephone has become an indispensable convenience to the Chinese people as it has to the Americans.

Even the home country, according to W. P. Strickland, of the International Western Electric Company, who just returned from China, the telephone service is growing rapidly. Seven new telephone exchanges have recently been completed at Nanking, Shanghai, Soochow, Wusheng and Peking. A toll line is now under consideration between Shanghai, Nanking, Hankow, Tientsin and Peking.

It was this expansion of China's telephone system that made necessary a factory in Shanghai for the manufacture of telephone equipment. While this work is of a technical nature the Chinese people are very adaptable to it. They not only are deft, but patient and learn very quickly.

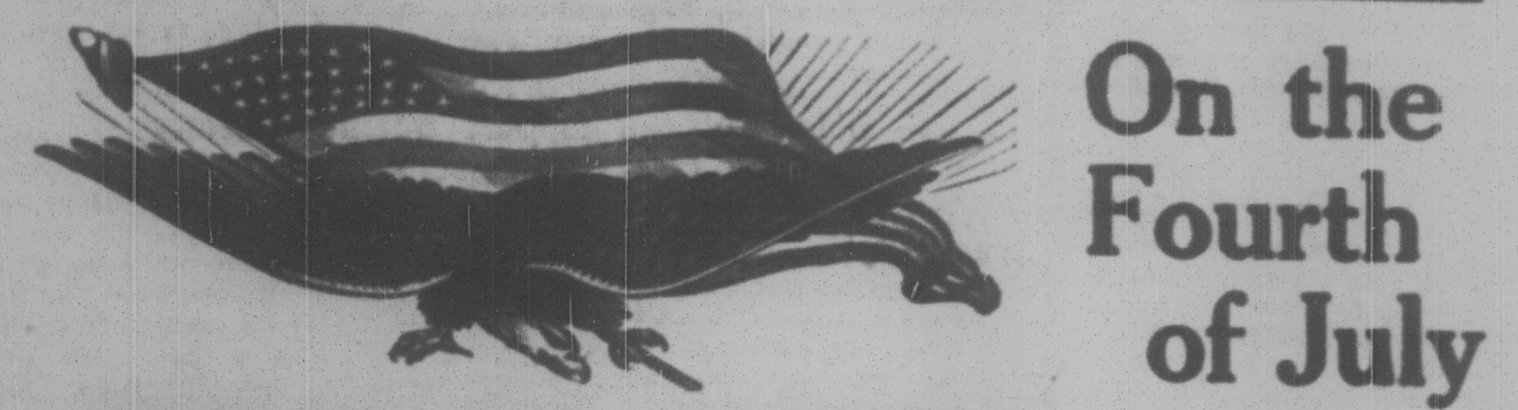
