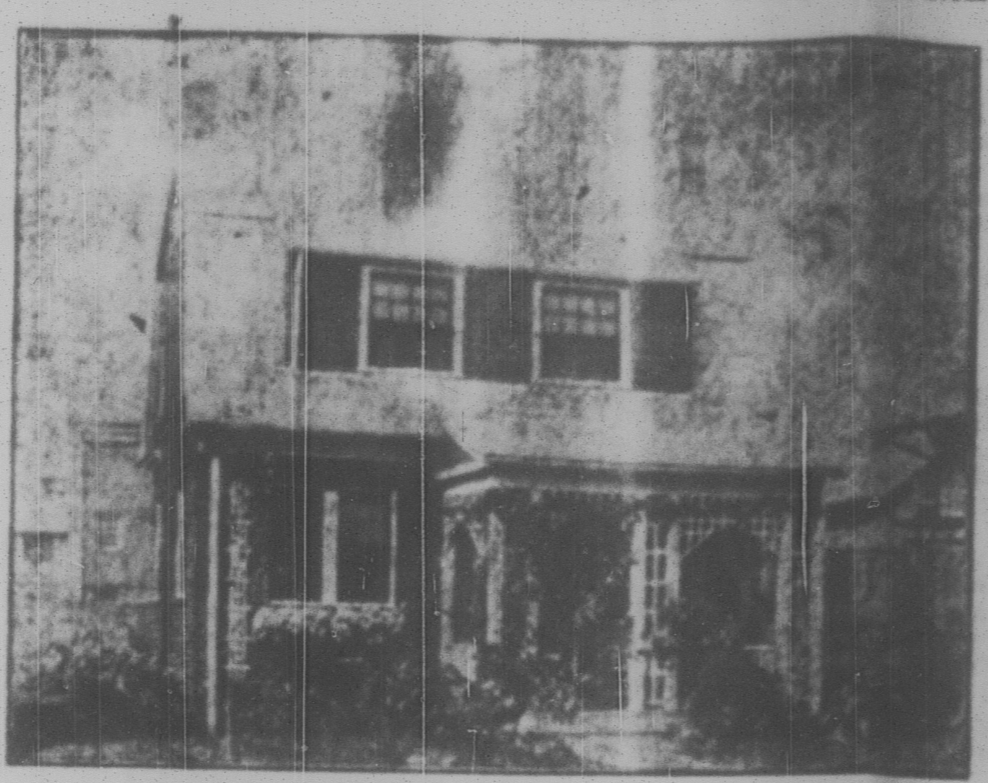

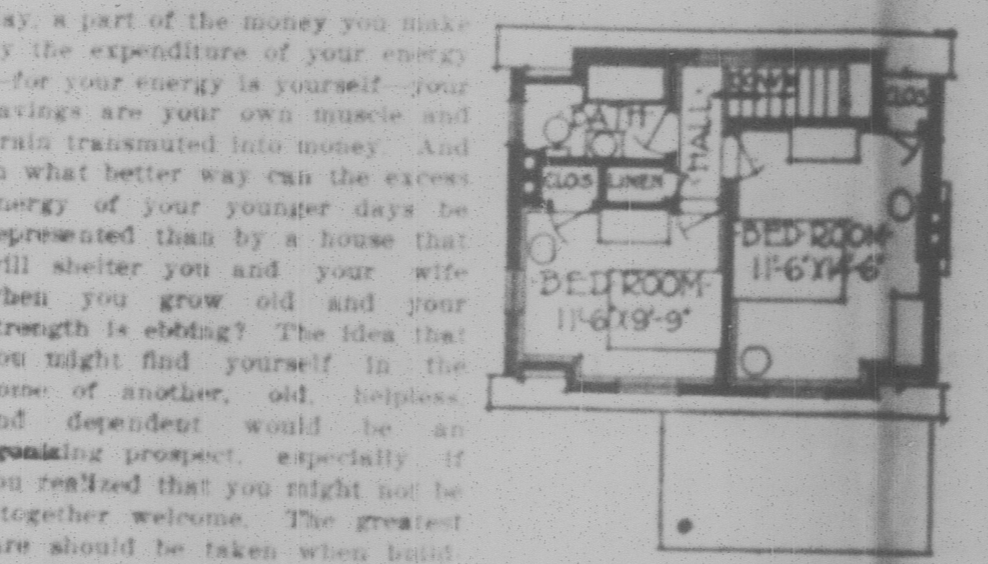

Telephone Companies Unable to Meet All Demands For Service

PHILADELPHIA—The telephone industry will spend more than \$100,000,000 in Pennsylvania this year for new wire, new switchboards, new telephone instruments and new buildings, according to a news bulletin issued by the Pennsylvania Public Service Information Committee.

It will require more than 7,000 freight cars to transport Pennsylvania's new telephone equipment from the factories this year. About three loaded cars must leave the factories each hour of every working day of the year.

Despite the large amount of new equipment all who want 'phones in the State cannot be supplied, as factories are unable to keep up with the demand, the committee reports.

McKeesport Bars Carnivals. "If it was willing to pay into the city a thousand dollars a day I would not grant a carnival company a permit to show in McKeesport," said Mayor George H. Lyle of the city to an agent who wanted to argue the question with the executive.

The carnival man got a permit from Burgess C. J. Brown of Portvue, who later was besieged with requests to revoke it. The Burgess tried to get the company to give up the permit, but met with refusal. Because of fear of a damage suit he took no further action. Portvue adjoins McKeesport. The carnival company posted signs on telephone poles directing traffic to the show grounds. Mayor Lyle had them torn down. Residents of the district are protesting about alleged lack of observance of sanitary regulations.

FRANKLIN—Excitement prevailed in the Franklin postoffice, but nobody was hurt when an explosion at the automatic cancelling machine caused clerks and patrons to leap to their feet. A thoughtless boy, mailing a number of explosive caps to a friend, put them in an ordinary envelope. The moment the stamping machine hit the caps they went off with a loud report.

Among the questions which the blanks contain are several relative to the employee's length of service, salary and service prior to entering state employ, as well as the pledge which requires all employees to uphold the constitution of the United States and Pennsylvania.

Pardon Board Favors Commutation. HARRISBURG—Michael Castellani of Revloc, Cambria county, convicted of first degree murder for the death of Paul Seina, was recommended for a commutation of sentence by the state board of pardons, which announced the longest list of pardons in its history. Commutation of sentence was also recommended for Philip Cimo of Clearfield county, also convicted of murder.

Pardon was refused in the case of Charles Morhouse of Cambria county, convicted of robbery. New Tariff is Filed. HARRISBURG—A supplement to existing rates was filed today with the Public Service Commission by the North Cambria Water Company, furnishing service in Spangler and vicinity. The new tariff aids the rate for public fire hydrants in excess of 12 of \$30 each per annum. The present rate is \$40 per annum for each hydrant. The new schedule which is to become effective on August 1, adds another item to the present schedule and makes it possible for the Spangler officials to add to their fire hydrant system at a reduced rate.
