An Ordinance of the Borough of Patton, providing for the construction of a public sewer on Seventh Avenue, from Palmer Avenue north a distance of two hundred feet.

Ordinance No. 160

An Ordinance signifying a desire on the part of the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of Patton, Cambria County, Pennsylvania, to increase the indebtedness of the Borough of Patton in the sum of fifty thousand dollars for the purpose of providing funds with which to construct a filtration plant to properly filter and purify the water supplied for domestic and commercial purposes by the municipal water works of the Borough of Patton, and to erect and build such buildings, and install such pumps and machinery as may be necessary to properly and efficiently equip the same.

Notice is hereby given to the electors of the Borough of Patton, County of Cambria, and State of Pennsylvania, in pursuance and by authority of Ordinance No. 160 of the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of Patton, dated the 9th day of July, 1923, that a special election will be held on the 10th day of August, 1923, between 7 o'clock A. M. and 7 o'clock P. M., at the Miner's Hall in the First Ward, and the Kelly Building in the Second Ward, of the Borough of Patton, Pennsylvania, for the purpose of voting on the proposed increase of the bonded indebtedness of the said Borough of Patton in the sum of fifty thousand dollars for the purpose of providing funds with which to construct a filtration plant to properly filter and purify the water supplied for domestic and commercial purposes by the municipal water works of the Borough of Patton, and to erect and build such buildings, and install such pumps and machinery as may be necessary to properly and efficiently equip the same.

Section 2. That notice of said election be given by the corporate authorities of the Borough of Patton, by weekly advertisement in the Patton Courier, the daily newspaper of general circulation printed in the Borough of Patton, in the Cambria County, Legal Journal, and by at least twenty hand bills posted in as many public places in the Borough of Patton, during at least thirty days prior to said election, and said notice shall contain a statement of the amount of the last assessed valuation of the taxable property of the said Borough, the amount and percentage of the proposed increase, and the purpose for which the indebtedness is to be increased.

Such election shall be under the same regulations as provided by law for the holding of municipal elections and the County Commissioners of Cambria County, Pennsylvania, are hereby authorized and directed to distribute for in the laws of the State of Pennsylvania, governing the increase of indebtedness by municipalities. Enacted and ordained this 9th day of July A. D. 1923.

The increase is based on the increased selling price of tin plate, in accordance with the agreement existing between the men and the company. Fifteen hundred men are benefited by the increase.
