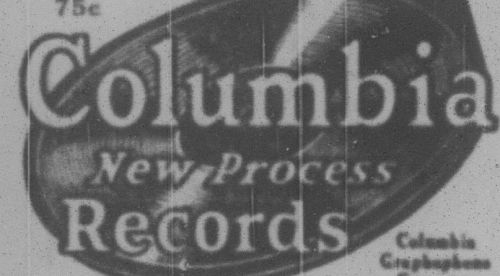

Lightning Shock Kills Man
ALTOONA—Frank Benner, 54 years old, who was shocked by lightning when his home in Juniata was struck during a storm Tuesday evening, died in a hospital.

Farrell Man Dies of Tetanus
SHARON—Fred Jones, 23 years old of Farrell, died Monday from tetanus resulting from a small wound he inflicted in his right hand on July 4, last. He was handling a toy pistol.

New Bus Line Granted
HARRISBURG—The Public Service Commission approved the application of Elmer L. Shirley, of Beaswell, for a new auto bus line between Beaswell and Jernettown, Somerset county.

Farmer Badly Shocked
INDIANA—J. R. Startzell, 45 years old, a farmer of Oliveburg, was rendered unconscious Friday night when a bolt of lightning struck a tree under which he was driving a team of horses. The horses were knocked down. Startzell recovered 45 minutes later and apparently suffered no ill effects.

Butler Farmers Need Help
BUTLER—Butler county farmers are in serious need of workmen, due to the drain made by the building trades and industrial plants of the district at higher prices than farmers can pay. Tenants are leaving farms and going to work for \$8 to \$10 a day. One farmer has offered one-third of his 40 acres of fall grain to anyone who will cut and thresh the crop, but has no takers.

Boy Loses Life
BROWNSVILLE—William Cox, 14 gave his life in a futile effort to save

that of his chum, William Keibler, son of Charles W. Keibler, lockmaster of lock No. 5, who had fallen in the Monongahela river. The boys had been playing on a raft above the lock, when the Keibler lad fell overboard. His chum immediately into the river after him. The Keibler boy locked his arms around Cox and they both went down. The bodies were recovered later.

Firemen Rescue Lineman
PITTSBURGH—Harry Rafferty, aged 34, of 3139 Breckenridge street, a telephone lineman, was rescued by firemen from No. 11 Engine Company after he had been severely shocked and burned by an electric wire with which he had come in contact while repairing a telephone cable. He was suspended helpless on his safety belt when taken down by fireman on an extension ladder.

Fan House Struck by Bolt
HAZLETON—Struck by a bolt of lightning shortly before 11 o'clock Tuesday night a fan house of the high Valley Coal Co. at the Drifton colliery, was totally destroyed. The building and its contents are a total loss.

Two More Tidouste Gushers
OIL CITY—The Proper Oil Company has just completed two flowing wells in the Tidouste oil field, the largest that have been reported there in recent months. Drilling activity in the Tidouste field is very slight at the present time, most of the operators having shut down their drilling on account of the low crude oil.

500 Gondolas to be Flats
SHARON—New York Central railroad has awarded a contract to the Pennsylvania Tank Car Company for converting 500 gondola cars into flat cars. It will keep the local plant operating steadily for three or four months.

Pittsburgh Mail Clerk Honored
SCRANTON—Joseph P. Sherr of Lancaster was re-elected president of the Pennsylvania Federation of Post-office Clerks at their second annual convention Monday. Other officers elected were: Vice president, F. A. Thretheway of Scranton, G. D. Springer of Bethlehem, T. L. Donnegan of New Castle, Hunter Cingan of Allentown, Frederick Haus of Pittsburgh, Mary Tobin of Forest City; secretary treasurer, Ellis Kline of Lancaster. Allentown was selected for next year's convention.

27 Teachers Quit State
STATE COLLEGE—The resignation of 27 members of the instructional, research and extension faculties of the Pennsylvania State College, representing the usual June turnover, has been announced. Fifteen others have been granted leave of absence for the next collegiate year and a number of new appointments are being made to fill vacancies prior to the opening of college in September. This turnover is about the average in the faculty of over 300 at Penn State.

Missing Balloonist Penna. Bay
GREENSBURG—Lieut. Telford B. Null, missing naval balloonist, until his enlistment in the navy in 1917, after his graduation from Washington & Jefferson college, lived at Ruffsdale, near here, where he was born and received his early education. Lieut. Null served with the American naval forces in England throughout the war and was at Hull, England, at the time of the collapse of the dirigible ZR-2, August 25, 1921 with the loss of more than 40 lives. Lieut. Null had been named a member of the American detachment to pilot the dirigible, which had been purchased from the British government, to the United States and was a member of the crew in one of the test flights before the disaster. His parents are dead. His wife, whom he married during the war, lives at Hadonfield, N. J. Until he was transferred to Lakehurst, N. J., a few weeks ago, Lieut. Null had been stationed at Hampton Roads.

One of the most curious trees in the world is found in Mexico. The natives call it the handflower-tree. From the center of each flower springs a stem shaped like a human hand and arm.
